## Shared Ownership Properties at St. Mary's Development

The Fosseway Housing Association of Cirencester is currently developing three Shared Ownership properties at the former St. Mary's Home development.

The properties are three storey, two-bedroom town houses, approx. 88sq.m (950sq.ft.) in size, with sales prices in the range of £165-170k, of which a 50% share would be purchased.

#### What is Shared Ownership?

It means buying a share in a property built by a Registered Social Landlord (RSL) - in this case Fosseway Housing Association. In most cases you will purchase a share of a property representing 50% of the purchase price. The other 50% will, initially, be retained by the RSL. A sub-market rent will be payable on the 50% which is owned by the RSL; this is cheaper than a market rent and usually means that it is cheaper than buying outright. It is possible, if you want, to increase your share of the property.

#### Who is it for?

It is becoming increasingly difficult for people to purchase on the open market due to increases in house prices. Shared ownership can help people get onto the housing ladder by reducing the overall costs. It is particularly suitable for people who are in regular employment, but are unable to afford a mortgage to cover the total cost of purchasing a property on the open market.

#### Who Qualifies?


For the Shared Ownership properties at the St. Mary's development, priority will be given to people living in, or who have strong connections with, the parish of Painswick. The next priority will be for similarly placed residents in the parishes of Miserden and Bisley. In order to be considered for shared ownership you will need to be registered on the Council's Housing/Tenants Transfer Register. There are questions concerning Shared Ownership on the application form that you will need to answer. Nominations of people interested in Shared Ownership properties are passed by the Rehousing Team to the RSL.

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - by Leslie Brotherton

A report upon the usual monthly meeting of the Parish Council is not included this month, for the simple reason that no meeting was held in August.

Not to be outdone, however, we have looked through the Council's incoming correspondence file - as any member of the public may do - and noted at least some items which

will be reported when they meet in September.

About six matters attracted our attention and these are included as items elsewhere in this issue, with an asterisk against each heading. As ever, selection of items to report can only be subjective, but we hope we have 'spotted' some of general interest.

#### Census 2001

The Beacon has been looking out for the results of the 2001 census of the population at the 'small area' level ever since it was undertaken over two years ago. At long last we have managed, thanks to a combination and help of the County Council's Environmental Research Team and the Internet, to obtain the relevant information. We are pleased to share this with our readers.

Of some importance is any trend to be identified, and so that this can be shown we have dug into our own archives and the information we published in October 1993. It was a good job that we drew some figures together on that occasion because none could be found for years prior to 1981 after some hours spent on site or on the telephone to the County Archive, County Library Reference, County Hall, County History Library, the District Council or the Painswick Library. This has led us to make a note that any suggestion from any quarter that certain new policies are appropriate at such as civil parish levels anywhere in Gloucestershire based upon population trends should be viewed with some suspicion, solely because such cannot be founded upon accessible data for any of those areas.

So, we have reproduced all the data we can muster, and read-


ers with a penchant for figures and 'damn' statistics can draw conclusions of their own.

The manner in which census information is analysed prior to publication has changed a little over these thirty years 1971-2001. We have, therefore, needed to arrange the layout in a manner which enables comparisons to be made; hence the extra columns for 1991 and 2001.

The population within each age band is, of course, interesting in its own right, but we think that representing that as a percentage of the total for that year is a better indicator of the significance of the figure and these we have also included. The 'key' figures are, therefore, in the columns marked A,B C and D. We have included the figures for Stroud District and the whole County only so that the relativity of each age band in Painswick to the same in those areas can be discerned.

Finally, we have also shown the information contained in the four main columns as a chart, on the next page, so that fluctuations/trends can be seen at a glance.

A few of the thoughts which occur to us, but the beacon will welcome others from our readers

- the National Office of Statistics have themselves suggested that the figures for 1991 are slightly less 'robust' than they might have been; however, that makes only marginal difference at civil parish level
- the equivalence of population for 1991 and 2001 is entirely coincidental
- an upward movement of 16% in the 0-4 age band in the last ten years seems to be encouraging
- similarly 26% and 9% increases for the next two bands confirms the perception of more children than in 1991, most working through to the next bands in 2011
- a drop of 35% in the number of 15 to 19 year olds is startling, and more so compared with 1981 and a 46% drop since then, is a real puzzle; GCC researchers suggest that there is a direct relationship between these figures and the birth rate
- the most dramatic change of all lies in the 20-24 age band where the reduction in the last ten years is no less than 52%; 2604 nder whether more were off to university and colleges and enumerated elsewhere, or were there other reasons
- a 13% increase among the 45-64 age band is significant, but it was 10% for the preceding ten years
- a reduction in the 65-74 group of 15% seems to balance this out
- the overall increase in the 45+ age bands is under 4%
- howster the reduction of Quagesterthe 65+ must be significant beashire mind that such is within a quarter of our population


The Beacon invited Jennifer Payne of the County Council's Environment Directorate to shed any light she could upon the trend these figures show for the younger generation. Jennifer replied as follows:
"The decline in the numbers of 15, 29 year olds in Painciek is interesting but I don't think

"The decline in the numbers of 15-29 year-olds in Painsick is interesting but I don't think it is particularly strange. You will see from the chart below that a general decline in all the young age-groups set in after 1981 (earlier for the 0-4s) which was pretty widespread at that time due to a combination of factors - a falling birth-rate, deferring of family formation by couples and an exodus of young people from rural areas due to 'lack of opportunities' and expense of living/travel. Significantly this exodus appears to have continued to the present day in the 15-29 age-groups, but there has been a recovery in the 0-14 age-groups. This will almost certainly be due to in-migration of young families and the occurrence of later family formation, rather than a sudden rise in the local birth rate. It remains to be seen whether these 0-14 year-olds when they grow up choose to remain in the area or like their predecessors move away. In all probability the number of 15-29 year-olds will continue to fall.

I hope that these comments will be helpful."

#### **Painswick Centre**

Our community could boast that it has, in Painswick Centre, a venue worthy of the village; but are its roots secure?

It is some time since the Beacon carried an article to update news about the challenge taken on by the trustees, so we have been in touch with the Chairman, John Stephenson-Oliver to check out the situation. Our timing was propitious indeed, since they have their annual meeting coming up in late September (watch notice boards), but more about the significance of this 2003 event later.

The most heartening piece of information was to hear that the use of the Centre has quadrupled since 1999 and this has significantly affected financial viability, the No.1 headache when the trustees took over in that year. "There is no question, now, that the viability of the Centre has been proven" John told us, and went on to say that "but there are two challenges facing us in the medium term".

It seems that the first of these is to build further upon the use of the premises so that reserves of cash can be built up so that still more improvements can be made in upgrading the premises, and to provide a sinking fund to meet the invariably expensive maintenance that arises from time to time.

Regular users include ballroom dancing, the blues club, Painswick Players, PADFAS and the badminton club. Additionally, there are periodic users such as horticultural shows, craft exhibition, weddings and charity fund raising events. The judicious letting of parking spaces generates some revenue during weekdays, as does the accommodation exclusively set aside for the Guild of Gloucestershire Craftsmen's shop and base. "I can tell you that my trustee colleagues and I are very pleased that we have reached such a stage when we can see real improvements in the Centre and it is now an important part of the fabric of village life. "There is a friendly atmosphere about the place", John mused, "and it is particularly pleasing that the regular users include completely new groups such as ballroom dancing which meet local needs in a local setting.

We enquired as to the second 'challenge' John had mentioned, and it seems that much of what has been achieved has been by the efforts of a very small number of people. "I see it as imperative that there is greater job-sharing and public interest in this fine facility to move the Centre and its activities into the next phase of its operation" John said. "I intend to stand down as Chairman at the AGM in September, and nothing would please me and my colleagues more than there being a good turn out from both the public and user groups that evening; an expression of genuine interest in building upon what we have – not without difficulty and considerable effort – brought about."

There are, we understand, various ways in which others might greatly assist. Within such as community associations, and there are similarities here, regular user groups have security for their bookings and advantageous booking fees in return for active participation in the management of a centre and its maintenance. Could this be formalised for Painswick Centre, and bring with it the strength of numerous talents and interest in raising standards and the future prospects of this facility? Are there others in this community willing to contribute even a small fraction of their time to further the ideals now in place?

The Beacon looks forward to reporting upon what could prove to be an important annual meeting at another 'turning point' in the history of this valued village asset.








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#### Flu vaccinations

#### Russian Royalty

Did you ever wonder whatever happened to all those royal Russians after the Bolshevik Revolution?

A new course beginning the end of September entitled Refugees and Rogues: Russian Royalty after the Revolution will be able to answer all your questions. The first term of the course (Refugees), sponsored by the University of Bristol, will begin with the death of Nicholas II and his family and look at the investigation launched immediately after the murders as well as the recent investigations and the execution of other family members. #### The Threat to Painswick Human Sanctuaries

TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES

Sir, - Opinion is divided and feeling is running high in the Cotswolds as to the proposed Painswick by-pass road. The Gloucestershire branch of the C.P.R.E. is not quite unanimous and I am therefore debarred, as their chairman, from taking sides publicly in the discussion. But I am at liberty to express my views on the general issue which the discussion places before the Government for consideration and which I conceive to be of first-class national importance.

The Painswick Parish Council have voted unanimously against the proposal, believing that there is at least one alternative which would meet the requirements more satisfactorily. The Ministry of Transport nevertheless want this by-pass. We are grateful to them for the magnificent system of roads they are giving us and proud when we compare their achievements with similar efforts abroad; but the arguments they have brought forward in this connection have failed to modify local opposition. These arguments have however been reinforced by the assertion that the Ministries concerned with National Defence also want this by-pass; and in the present sensitive state of our patriotism this makes those in opposition uneasy. It raises the general issue to which I have referred.

Within the last 12 months our Gloucestershire countryside has been scarred by the building of gaunt aerodromes; munition factories are also seeking safety here in distance from the Eastern coast. In a few months the hum of aeroplanes will be constant in the air and the mechanical activities of various branches of rearmament will add to the new discord in our Cotswold fields and villages. This, as other countries, we have accepted as in-

evitable. But what of the future, here and elsewhere?

If, as some tell us, the Air Force must ultimately duplicate the Navy as a means of defence, it will follow that the land must provide anchorage, scientifically distributed, for many times the number of units hitherto occupying the broad seas. Can little England contain her share - if it is to be commensurate with our present defence requirements? At any rate it is certain that the time has come when - if as we older people still pray our civilisation is to be saved - sanctuaries must be planned and provided for human beings as thoughtfully and as wisely as they have been secured to birds and animals. Rest must be assured to the tired mind, quiet to the active thinker, peace for his creative dreams to the writer and the artist - as far removed as this narrow land will allow from the encircling rush of traffic and the tumult of armament.

Here surely is a task to which the Government should see that foresight and energy are devoted equal to that displayed by the Ministries controlling transport and defence. The Ministry of Health can do much; but a far more embracing power of supervision must be exercised by the Government in a matter which concerns immediately the spiritual and intellectual welfare of our people.

"Painswick proud," as we call her in Gloucestershire, enclosed in the hills, off the line of through-traffic, is the last of the natural human sanctuaries of considerable size left in the Southern Cotswolds. Cirencester, which successfully fought a lesser threat: in the early days of railway development, is being gradually overborne.




#### Music for listeners

Did you know that you can bowl whatever the weather, here in Painswick?





David Drew MP, and others have written to Parish Councils and Post Offices:

Dear Resident

Over the next few years, the system of paying benefits and pensions is changing. At present, millions of people are in the process of being contacted to explain how this will occur. Those receiving benefits and pensions are being asked to consider a number of options. These include having money paid straight into a bank account but also offer the chance to open a Post Office Card Account. This allows individuals to draw cash in person at the Post Office. We are writing to you now to publicise this important option in the hope that you will consider opening a Post Office Card Account and continue using your local Post Office, which is a vital local facility. It is important to note that you can use the Post Office either as a bank, or if you are in receipt of a benefit or a state pension via a Post Office Card Account. More details can be obtained from your Post Office. It is important that we all recognise the importance of continuing to use the Post Office and making use of the many services it can offer. These include:

- Buying travel insurance and home insurance at competitive rates
- Foreign currency with no commission charge and buy back without commission
- Payment of most utility bills without a transaction charge using cash, cheque or debit
  cards
- Making budget payments on utilities and TV licences using card or saving stamps.
- Cashing cheques and depositing cash or cheques. This service is only available using Alliance and Leicester, Barclays, Co-op, Lloyds and Cahoot
- On-line deposits for Alliance and Leicester, Barclays and Lloyds
- Buying stamps, posting parcels
- Arranging to collect parcels from the Post Office if you are out when the delivery is made
- Internet shopping and home shopping return service
- National Savings Bank including premium bonds
- Angling licences
- Special delivery for items of value and for next day delivery
- International priority services

#### Broadband: the plot thickens

The continuing saga of getting Painswick connected to an Asymmetric Digital Subscriber Line (ADSL) enabled exchange, i.e. on Broadband gets ever murkier. The good news is that BT has now set the trigger level for the Painswick exchange. The less good news is that the level has been set at 500 - ie 500 local phone users need to register interest wit BT in Broadband – and this is somewhat higher than was expected a few months ago. Thus far approaching 200 have registered, so we urgently need another 300 concerned Painswickians.

Why does Broadband matter to Painswick? Broadband matters because it is becoming one of the key factors for people and businesses choosing to live and work in a particular locality. Much of our future economic health as a community will depend on Painswick being seen as an attractive location for doing business over the Internet. Broadband is vital both for maintaining present jobs and for creating new ones in new businesses. Furthermore, the perceived advantages of Broadband, particularly with regard to its use by children at home and at school, is actually opening up a house-price differential between those areas with Broadband and those without it. This differential was identified as a powerful argument in helping Nailsworth generate interest in Broadband and reach its Broadband target trigger.

What can we do in Painswick? What should we do? There seem to be two lines of action, which are not necessarily mutually exclusive:

- 1. Get a BT Broadband campaign going, along the lines of the successful Nailsworth campaign
- 2. Examine non-BT alternatives, such as the LoopScorpio

wireless proposal reported in the March issue of the Beacon

For BT Broadband, the seeds of a Painswick campaign have been set. Local businessman, Chris Brent-Smith has already volunteered himself to BT as the registered point of contact to get the campaign going. What is needed now is for more concerned Painswickians to join in. Perhaps the Parish Council will give a lead.

On the question of non-BT alternatives, Adrian Lane of Painswick-based ARL Internet Solutions has been in discussions with Peter Cartwright of Loop Scorpio, which has already been developing wireless broadband networks in Ledbury and Highnam. Loop Scorpio has set a target of 80-100 potential Painswick potential users to make it worthwhile coming here next, although they emphasize that they are concentrating on making sure the Ledbury and Highnam networks are up and running smoothly before looking elsewhere. Peter Cartwright comments 'Both networks are now progressing quite well, though we do still have the expected teething challenges associated with something new.'

Whatever option is chosen, the key is to encourage enough Painswickians to register their interest. Registering interest means just that: it does not imply any commitment to buy. To register interest with BT, simply log on to <a href="https://www.bt.com/btbroad-band/register/">www.bt.com/btbroad-band/register/</a> and follow the links. And just think, whilst you're drumming your fingers waiting for it to download, if we had broadband it would have appeared in the blink of an eye!



#### **Personal Training arrives**

If you've always thought of personal trainers as being the preserve of over-pampered, sun-bronzed celebs, then think again! Nowadays, it seems, we all need personal trainers if we are to turn that 'comfortable rear end into a pert burn and get a six-pack other than the one in the fridge!' The quote comes from Lucy Brecknell, who has just opened up as Painswick's first Personal Trainer dedicated to improving our fitness health and well being through a blend of physical training, nutritional advice and massage therapy.

Lucy, who grew up in Painswick, graduated from Reading University last summer with an honours degree in Animal Sciences, after which she took an intensive course in personal training, nutritional advice and sports therapy. Thus qualified, she landed a position with the Seb Coe Health Club in Gloucester, where she is now based and from where she has now launched her own business. Her ultimate aim is to have her own therapy centre, working alongside other complementary health professionals.

So why can't I achieve the body beautiful on my own, without a personal trainer?

'Well, you could,' she said, eyeing my paunch doubtfully, 'but the point of a personal trainer is not just to devise the most appropriate fitness programme for you, but to motivate you through it; to get you over the boredom threshold.'

The key, she went on to explain, is to achieve a balance between building up muscle via weight training (which speeds up the metabolism) and cardio-vascular exercise to burn off the fat. The objective is to tone up not to bulk up. And you can do all this, with Lucy's guidance, in your own home, if you don't fancy fighting the flab in front of others in the gym.

Mind you, if you choose the gym, you get use of the pool, sauna and steam room at the Seb Coe Health Club all included in the cost. Ah yes! The cost. Expect



to pay between £18 and £25 per one hour session (or less if you go with a friend).

'Remember,' said Lucy as she sprinted off to her next appointment, 'You're born with your bones but what covers them is up to you!'

#### Fox problem

On the Sunday morning following the dog show, my husband and I walked round the Recreation ground to ensure that everyone had picked up their dog mess, which, with two exceptions, they had.

However, I was horrified to find that the area around the children's play area was littered with fox excrement. I picked up no less than 12 lots!

The only reason I can think of as to why the foxes are using that area as their toilet is because people must be dropping food there, or placing discarded food and wrappers in the rubbish bin near the play area. If dog mess is considered to be a threat to public safety then fox mess must be considered doubly so. After all dogs (particularly in this area) are regularly wormed to cut down on internal parasites and foxes do not have such advantages. The simplest solution would be to ensure that all waste food and wrappings are either taken home or discarded well away well away from the play area. Fencing could be considered as an alternative but foxes have been known to jump 6 feet when there is the lure of food on the other side and I am sure nobody would like to see the play area segregated from the rest of the Recreation Ground by 6 foot fences.


This is a reminder for any one else who might be interested to give me a ring on 812130 by 12th September please.

We have a waiting list of people needing places, most of whom are with elderly parents. We shall shortly be looking into the right area to set up another home. It is much needed.

I have tried to condense more than twenty years work into a few lines. I hope it will give a little insight into why we are so very grateful to William and Nicola Nash and their delightful and very professional choir. Our thanks go to them and to all who attended the concert and helped to raise such a magnificent sum for Homes Foundation.


\* Road closures for drainage works
