Don't bank on it!

Last month's item concerning the frustration caused by recent unscheduled closures of the LloydsTSB branch in Painswick and the threat that we might lose the branch for good evoked considerable response amongst Painswickians. A number of local LloydsTSB customers - both business and personal - have contacted us to express their concerns.

Speaking on behalf of a major Painswick businesses, the Rococo Garden, Paul Moir emphasised the importance he attached to being able to bank on a regular basis, twice a week, at the local branch and the serious inconvenience caused by the recent unannounced closures. "If the Painswick branch were to close permanently, we would change banks" he said, "The existence of a local branch is the only reason we are still with LLoydsTSB."

A regular business and personal customer of the bank, Norman Rampton, commented "Thank goodness for the Painswick Beacon! Without this, local LloydsTSB customers would still be blissfully unaware of the review of the future of the Painswick branch. As a large and responsible organisation, I would hope that LloydsTSB would consider consulting their customers. Sadly this does not appear to have any place in, what is likely to be, a purely commercial decision based on usage and turnover."

He emphasised that the branch was much appreciated and valued for giving good personal service, something he considered lacking in much of today's commercialised and internet world. He strongly felt that closure of the branch would have repercussions on the village as a whole.

Another local LloydsTSB customer, Mrs HF Kilmister wrote to the Beacon to express her concern and annoyance at the recent repeated closures. "Nowadays you never know until you get there whether it will be open or not and you cannot ring them in advance as there is no longer a direct line to the branch. After one such closure I rang the call centre and was told it was due to a faulty alarm, but the staff in the branch said it was due to staff problems. The latest unheralded closure was on 29th July and as I left the premises in frustration I counted six people all wanting to use the branch."

She urges customers to complain about what she fears could be a back door method of closing the branch permanently, which she considers would be a devastating loss to the village. She wrote to the branch manager in Stroud responsible for Painswick expressing this fear but has received no response at all.

Sheer dogged persistence by yet another complaining customer, Phillip Oakley, eventually produced the somewhat underwhelming response from Sara Lilly, LloydsTSB Local Director, that the decision to close the branch on a few occasions recently "was made to overcome unforeseeable circumstances..." She went on to assure Mr Oakley that "we endeavour to meet

our customers' needs and on these occasional situations, consideration is made to ensure the availability of alternative ways of conducting their business." Sir Humphrey would be proud of Ms Lilly!

We approached LloydsTSB press office for an on-the-record comment. A spokesperson admitted that on a few occasions recently the branch had had to close 'for security reasons' because of staff shortages brought on by holidays and illness. However, he denied there were any plans to close the Painswick branch permanently. Further probing brought forth the comment that "the branch network in general was under constant review to maximise the efficiency of the service offered and that it was impossible to give cast iron guarantees about the future of any particular branch." He went on to say that 'co-locations' (ie branches close together like the two branches in Stroud) were being looked at particularly closely now that the merger between Lloyds and TSB service infrastructures had been completed. He refused to comment on whether Painswick was also considered to be a 'co-location' as far as Stroud was concerned.

Those of you not entirely reassured by the above comments might agree with Mrs Kilmister's parting shot in her letter to the Beacon...

"Don't sit back: if you want a Bank in Painswick make your voices heard!"

Roadworks will close much of the centre of Painswick (Victoria Street, part of St.Mary's Street and Tibbiwell) for the month of September. What are described as "essential carriageway and footway works" start on Monday, 4th September and could last for up to four weeks. Further details are on page 2.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - by Leslie Brotherton

No meetings of the Parish Council took place during August.

Although there was no meeting of the Council in August, a 'trawl' through the Council's correspondence file, available for public inspection whenever their office is open, yielded some information which will interest quite a few readers.

Bledisloe Cup

Painswick did not get past the second round this year. The latest information is that our neighbours Upton St.Leonards and more distant Bourton-on-the-Water are through to the finalists' round.

Neighbourhood Wardens

Two Wardens have commenced 4-hour duties per week in the Painswick area as an experiment to see whether their operating hereabouts is as effective as they have proved to be elsewhere in the Stroud area. The District Council meets the expense of this 'free' trial, which will be evaluated towards the end of six months, with the Parish Council then needing to decide as to whether to contribute towards the expenses, and for how many hours a week, thereafter.

Road resurfacing/closure

Notices have been displayed in the village centre indicating that Victoria Street, part of St.Mary's Street and Tibbiwell, will be closed while "Essential carriageway and footway works" are carried out. The work is due to start next Monday, 4th September, and could last for up to four weeks. The Parish Council, and affected residents, have been advised that access to properties will be maintained as much as possible.

Gloucestershire Highways have awarded this contract to Hanson, who in turn will, residents are assured, 'keep inconvenience to a minimum'.

They go on to express their appreciation of the co-operation received and hope that the long-term benefits of a new sur-

face will outweigh any short-term delays. All residents and businesses whose property fronts the works have, it is stated, been notified personally.


Clearance of trees and scrub on highways land at A4173 end of Jenkins Lane






Appeal for information

Police are appealing for witnesses and information regarding two recent incidents in and around Painswick. The first incident concerned two girls - one aged 12, the other 13 - who were playing near Painswick Beacon around 3.15 pm on August 2nd. A man stopped his car on the Gloucester Road near the entrance to the golf course and asked if they wanted to play football. Initially they followed him to a nearby wood and when he made an improper suggestion they ran away. The man is thought to be in his 40s and is described as white, just over 5 feet tall, with blonde/brown hair and a "funny" left eye. He was wearing a scruffy blue top and dark blue jeans that were muddy, as if he had just come from work. His car was black and shiny as if brand new and was travelling from Painswick towards Gloucester.

Anyone who witnessed the incident or has any information is asked to call Gloucestershire Police on 0845 090 1234 or the Crimestoppers Hotline anonymously on 0800 555 111 quoting incident 347 of August 2nd

Also at about 1.20pm on August 9th, a resident of Stamages Lane saw a white lorry with a large cab leaving the lane at speed and heading in the general direction of Cheltenham. The driver had a moustache and was wearing a woolly hat. 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

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


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Going wild at school

Painswick Club

Past President of the Painswick Club: The recent 'DID YOU KNOW?' articles about the Painswick Centre seem to gloss over the real purpose and intent of Mrs Williams's generosity.

The 'Working Men's Club and Institute' was the intended main beneficiary. The Trustees were endowed with the care of the buildings and the trusteeship of the Club. They were to oversee the Club and the rules by which it operated.

To be kept independent, the Trustees were given at least three cottages in the village and the Central Stores, rents from which were used for the upkeep of the property.

Profits from the Club were invested in the Trustees to be used to maintain the structure of the buildings, any excess to be spent improving the Club facilities, eg purchase of billiard tables, soft furnishings, bar equipment etc.

Sometime about 1938, the Central Stores were sold off by the Trustees. The Club continued to occupy the premises and underwent gradual changes to the way it operated over the years, membership in its last few years being in excess of 400. It was forced by the actions of the Trustees to close in early 1999.

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Tiny letters?

Providing the response is less than 150 words, it will normally be printed at the same time as the original letter. Hopefully in many cases the response will be a brief message, probably written by the coordinating editor for the month.
- 5.) Where the topic warrants it, some letters may lead to the preparation of an editorial article.
- The Beacon accepts letters for publication, as with other articles, assuming in good faith that their content is accurate.

We hope that this more structured approach will help both us and our correspondents to produce a lively, informative and - at times - provocative letters page.

The Queen of the Cotswolds possesses many fine residences, and the church, with its far famed peel of bells, is the pride of the district, but for many years the need has been felt of a place where inhabitants could meet in comfort for a social evening or spend their leisure in healthy recreation. Hearing of the great want of the inhabitants, Mrs Frances Williams decided to present the town with a building that would serve the purposes of a concert hall, library, baths and a place for recreation.

The Painswick Centre was born! Its first Trustees were Mr. L.W.E. Bicknell, Mr. E.T.W. Reed Jnr. of Wick Street House, Mr. C.W.D. Perrins, Mr. F.A. Hyett (President), the Rev. W.H. Seddon and Mr. E. Reed. Perhaps we have a descendent of one of the original Trustees living in Painswick today?

We have been asked to publicise the activities of Heyday, a not-for-profit membership organization, set up last May, with a mission to help people prepare for and make the most of retirement. To this end Heyday publishes a bi-monthly glossy lifestyle magazine of the same name.

It is also in the process of conducting what it claims is the biggest ever consultation exercise of people in their fifties and sixties on a range of issues, including work and retirement. To date, over 60,000 'baby boomers' have responded to a survey called *Have your say* and apparently two thirds say they don't want to retire at 65.

Partly as a result and supported by Age Concern, Heyday is currently taking the government to court under the Employment Equality (Age) Regulations (2006) over employment rights for people over 65. More details from www.heyday.org.uk or the local organizer, Maureen Paul, on 01452 506640.

350 years of Christ Church and the Quakers in Painswick...

The weekend of 5th/6th August brought celebrations to mark the 350th anniversaries of Quakerism in Painswick as well as continuous non conformist worship at Christ Church throughout that period. Christ Church was formerly the Cornelius Winter Memorial Church.

Writing in his book "350 years of Quakerism in Painswick" Doctor Jim Hoyland says that not only is 2006 the 350th anniversary of Quakerism (The Society of Friends) in Painswick but also the tercentenary of the Friends Meeting House in Vicarage Street. He further comments that the double celebration with Christ Church "is no coincidence, as many radical, non conformist sects emerged out of the political and religious turmoil of the 1650's, the time of Cromwell's Commonwealth, when they were often persecuted".

To mark the joint anniversaries, Christ Church and The Friends held joint celebrations. An exhibition of Quaker work and worship was on display in the Friends Meeting House on Saturday and, with the usual Meeting for Worship taking place on the Sunday, there was a further opportunity to view the exhibition.

Our picture (below) shows Christopher

Barclay reading about his great-greatgreat-great-grandfather, Robert Barclay, one of the founding fathers of the Quaker movement. Another exhibition reflecting the 350 years of worship was held in the Christ Church hall on the Saturday with cream teas served.

In the evening, a concert, Seasons and



Senses, given by Chor@ was held in Christ Church with strawberries and champagne served during the interval.

The concert was a great success comprising an exciting and eclectic mix of choral and solo performances, including Gaudete, the 23rd Psalm, Misty, the Hallelujah Chorus, Londonderry Air, Sweet Adeline and a rousing South African anthem, Freedom is coming!





During the afternoon of Sunday 6th August, a service was held in Christ Church to commemorate the 350 years of worship. During the service the history of the church was read in four parts and there was the reading of the Roll of Ministers.



Conserving the Tombs

Centreline, a local firm of architectural stonemasons, has just started a conservation programme of work to restore the tombstones in St Mary's Churchyard.

The collection of tombs and monuments in the beautiful setting of our famous churchyard is considered by many experts to be of national importance, and is often quoted as 'the finest collection of table tombs in the country'. It forms part of our national heritage.

A lot of fine carving detail has already been lost from the monuments due to erosion and poor conservation methods in the past. More structural damage will occur if the corrosion damage, from the iron cramps holding the monuments together, is not arrested and corrected. Out of the total of over 320 monuments, work has now begun on the 98 tombstones in the worst condition.

Our heritage is not just the stonework, but also the vast amount of material contained in the tombstone inscriptions, about our local

and national history during the 16th to 19th centuries. This is partly recorded within archive materials collected by the late Roy Truman. It is now being collated and researched. By means



of publications, education packs, displays and exhibitions, the knowledge and interest in the tombstones will be secured and available for current and future generations. All of this takes time and costs money.

The stonework conservation work is planned over a five year period, with breaks during the severest of the cold weather. The publication and display materials should become available over the next twelve months.

Family Worship: a new family service

A new service is about to be launched at St Mary's. The new Family Worship plans to be a lively and informal service, aimed primarily at young people and children whilst still containing valuable teaching for the more mature among us. Starting on 10th September, the service will take place on the second Sunday of each month at 11.15 am.

This exciting development reflects the growing number of young Christians and Christian families in our village, but you do not need to be young or a family to come – everyone is very welcome. So why not join us on 10th September and be part of something new?

NB There will be no Family Worship in November due to Remembrance Sunday.

Those people have mostly long gone, which is why I have tried to make this a Painswick project for Painswick people to look after the heritage of Painswick. However we are also spreading our net wider, and have already had enquiries from people in Australia researching their ancestors and donating to our appeal.






My Fair Lady Comes to Painswick

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

Double promotion for Painswick

This has been a very successful season for the club. Both the first and second elevens are to be promoted and next season they will play in the newly formed Gloucestershire Premier league which has first and second eleven divisions. This is the third consecutive year that the first eleven will have been promoted. Last Saturday, 26th August, the first eleven travelled to Tewkesbury for the final league match of the season and restricted the home side to the modest total of 158 for the loss of eight wickets, Dan Cave taking 3 for 28. The Amani charity gives shelter, food, care and education to children, many of whom have been abandoned or orphaned through AIDS. Jade who is to visit the home next March told the Beacon that in return for her fund-raising efforts she has been offered the opportunity to climb Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest mountain in Africa. She expressed her considerable appreciation to the players and to everyone who contributed and supported the event which Jade said had raised the "fantastic" total of £503.51. Cupola restored



Our picture shows the cupola at the Church of Our Lady & St Therese in Friday Street, which has been recently renovated by local firm, Centreline. A number of Painswickians have remarked on how beautiful it now looks with the pillars now restored.

The church was originally built in 1934 but, following bomb damage in 1941, it was not fully refurbished until 1956, when the cupola was added. The Journal of the Gloucestershire and North Avon History Society records that "Externally the main body of the old structure with its slate roof was retained. Entirely new work was largely confined to the belfry over the main doorway and the new south wall. The classical style belfry incorporated a

lead-covered dome, supported by eight white pillars, and was surmounted by an orb and gilt cross. Carved limestone blocks were used to face the building and the standard of work was considered to be of the highest order. The niche over the doorway was designed to house a statue."

It is the rounded dome, called a cupola, which forms part of the recently completed restoration work.



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
Coaches to Bath & London

The maxim "make hay while the sun shines" comes to mind, the coming year, I don't believe will be as certain as we are experiencing today. All the same, property still remains the investors safe haven, even if it goes down, historically it has always bounced back better than ever before. Here in Painswick and other Cotswold villages we continue to be pretty safe, people will always want to live here and supply will probably never fully satisfy demand.

Since my last report we have had a very busy time, some of our best results for many years. New instructions have been steady but not enough to keep up with the increased sales and demand. These include a really attractive four bedroomed house in Woodborough Close, a two bedroomed apartment near The Falcon, one of Painswick's fine Georgian houses in the centre, a three bedroomed cottage in Vicarage Street, two properties in Edge, a nearly new five bedroomed house and an individual detached bungalow in large walled garden. In Slad two more properties, a charming four bedroomed detached cottage and spacious four bedroomed detached bungalow with superb views and in Sheepscombe a really attractive detached period cottage. Several sales have been agreed and contracts exchanged, we found a buyer for the Lamp House which proceeded to completion quickly, also 1 Court Cottage in Butt Green, both Woodbury and Angels Roost in Vicarage Street, 6 Berry Close, 14 Gloucester Road, Edge Cottage at Edge, Rose Cottage at Cranham, Calfway House at The Camp, Hornbeams at Slad and Woodlands Farm at Churchdown.
