

A46 to re-open on schedule? The A46, which was closed on 10th August as a result of a landslip caused by the summer's floods, is on schedule to re-open

The A46, which was closed on 10th August as a result of a landslip caused by the summer's floods, is on schedule to re-open on 15th February.

Gloucestershire Highways and County Council teams have overseen an extensive geological and structural investigation to



understand the full scale of the risk now and in the future so that the most effective and long-term solution could be determined.

Major ground works were also needed, including the removal of 1000 tonnes of material to stabilise the slip and stop further ground movement, while continual monitoring was undertaken to check for any new movement. As this work took place, detailed designs of the permanent works were undertaken, and Severn Bore were contracted to undertake a major piling programme to underpin the surface of the road. In addition, vital services such as gas and water mains had to be diverted and protected to ensure homes and businesses did not lose supplies.

Throughout all of this, the risk of the slip worsening leading to a catastrophic collapse of the road had to be carefully monitored and managed.

Severn Bore began working on site in mid November and by 18th December they had completed all 37 piles (bored, casing installed, reinforcement installed and concrete placed), just two days behind the original schedule.

Embankment stability monitoring has not identified any movement or indication that the embankment stability has reduced and highway construction workers are now moving in to reconstruct the road. The overall work programme remains on schedule for completion and re-opening to traffic on 15th February.

Most locals, of course, seem to ignore the diversions in favour of various 'rat runs', notably Wades Lane/ Wick Street, which as a result of determined 'organic widening' has added a couple of metres road width in places!

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS - by Leslie Brotherton

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Nutgrove House

The committee, once again, considered the matter of the single course of 'stone' below the new railings outside this property in New Street, expressing their concern with the SDC Enforcement Officer's satisfaction with this material as compliant with the plans submitted. The committee were convinced that the material is reconstituted stone, and not the natural stone specified in the planning application.

It was agreed that as the Parish Council is expected to comply with regulations, so should the District Council in enforcement matters, and that the non-compliance should be placed on record.

Three Gables - dental surgery

The Chairman undertook to discuss concerns about the seemingly excessive external lighting to this property, not least because it is not open for clients in the evenings.

Street lighting

Peter Rowe reported having given further consideration to locations and extent to which some street lighting in Painswick might be extinguished during the early hours of each morning in order to reduce light pollution and consumption of electricity. Pending a detailed report to the Council residents are to be invited to express their views before the end of January, e.g. those living on the Croft estate.

PARISH COUNCIL

Quality Parish Council

The Council received the news that it had been accorded Quality Status, joining Cam and Newnham with such status in Gloucestershire. (See separate column for clarification of the characteristics of QPC.)

The reporting of its proceedings in these pages and elsewhere had contributed to this achievement, and the Council congratulated the Clerk upon the considerable work he had undertaken in making the detailed submission. A formal presentation of the award will be made in the Town Hall on Wednesday 23rd January at 7.30pm

Youth involvement

Chairman Terry Parker reported that a meeting had been held on the previous day with members of the 'Psalms' group,



together with leaders Tim and Kirstin Friend. Among expressed desires of young people was the early erection of the promised basketball hoop post and extended hard surround for ball bouncing, and the hope that some floodlighting can be restored to the front of the pavilion on the Recreation Field. Girls were keen on having a 'drop in' centre in the Pavilion. The Council agreed to press ahead with the post and hard standing at the earliest practicable date, after receiving a further report upon intended location, and investigate the introduction of lighting. The idea of a drop-in facility will also be investigated.

The occasion was taken to express the Council's thanks for the excellent service of Tim and Kirstin (who was unable to attend on this evening), who are moving elsewhere, and welcome Ruth Henderson, pictured here with Tim, to this work.

A46 reinstatement

The Chairman reported the latest news confirming that the carriageway at Salmon Springs should be restored for full use by mid-February. Although the Council remains appreciative of regular updating of progress through Joan Nash, it was a matter of continuing concern, and regret, that County Council officers do not directly inform the Parish Council – the most affected on the closed route of the A46 – of developments; representations in this regard continue to be made.

Upon the urging of Ann Burges Watson the Council agreed to seek the views and support of all other parishes 'enjoying' the absence of all but essential HGV in making strong representations to the County Council for such vehicles to be permanently re-routed away from the Brockworth-Stroud section. Apart from the obvious and experienced relief of the current absence of such vehicles, it was urged that further damage to the highway and adjoining properties would be obviated by continuing curtailment.

Feasibility study – community buildings Painswick Gateway

Upon enquiry from the Chair, Leslie Brotherton again reported that Painswick Gateway had received no response with regard to their offer in October to purchase the County Council's library premises, although it was understood to be imminent.

The Council decided to continue to defer consideration of instituting a feasibility study of usage of public meeting rooms in the village pending clarification as to the extent of provision through this project.

National Trail and interpretation centre

The Chairman reported that the proposition, strongly supported at the last meeting, to seek funding which would straddle seven years targeted at regeneration of economic activity through all parishes along the Cotswold Way NT and include an interpretation and management base in Painswick (see pages 2/3 of last issue), was being incorporated in a joint 'expression of interest' being formulated by Stroud and Tewkesbury District Councils entitled 'Water and Wool'. Gloucestershire First was helpfully undertaking the considerable documentation required in formulating the 'expression', which had to be submitted no later than 31st December.

Slad Common – gifting to the parish

The Council took note of the intention of the Manorship to gift Slad common to the Parish Council, and agreed to seek clarification of the precise extent of the land involved and associated matters.

Precept 2008-09

The Council received a further report from Chairman of the Finance and General Purposes Committee upon the financial projections of the Council and recommended precept upon the District Council for the coming financial year. Detail of these proposals was reported here last month (see page 2). Peter Rowe

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Tel: 01452 812587 Mob: 07768 173726 again expressed the view that any increase in expenditure reflected in the precept should be arbitrarily restricted to 5% and, when challenged as to how other expenditure regarded as urgent or essential could thereby be met, was unwilling to identify which items for which reserves had been set aside (e.g. replacement of grass cutter machinery) should be forfeited.

After further discussion the precept was set at $\pounds73,500$, effectively an increase of $\pounds4.42$ per Band D property - 14.4% in a full year.

Martin Slinger Outstanding community service



The Council was delighted to hear that Martin Slinger had received an invitation from HM Government to a reception at Lancaster House in London which Prime Minister Gordon Brown attended to thank representatives of areas where they had rendered outstanding service to their community during the flood crisis in the summer; Mr Brown only had time to directly meet with the Gloucestershire contingent before having to leave for a Commons' vote. Plaques had been presented to each person present; Martin is shown proudly holding his in our picture, and the Beacon is pleased to add its own tribute as his selection as Painswickian of 2007.

This new-found status is the reflection of a conscious decision taken by the Council in close collaboration with its Clerk, Roy Balgobin, to diligently work through a complete revision of its working practices.

The granting of the accolade is the product of careful scrutiny by independent external assessors who have satisfied themselves that the Council is competent to:

be representative of and actively involve all parts of their community
be effectively and properly managed, with members and officers upholding a high standard of conduct

• work closely with voluntary and community sector groups, and articulate the community's needs and wishes through effective communications, which might include the production of parish plans or other similar documents and

• work in partnership with other local authorities and agencies and, depending on their size, be able to deliver local services which give the best deal for the local community

HM Government, through its November 2000 Rural White Paper, 'Our Countryside: The Future. A Fair Deal For Rural England', set out a number of measures to give local people the opportunity to become more involved in the development of their communities. The Government believes that parish and town councils, as the tier of government that is closest to local communities, have a central role to play in improving local quality of life.

It will be of longer term interest to see how far Painswick's Parish Council comes under public pressure to exercise its powers to locally manage new activities as were previously not adopted to be within its scope such as, making 'bye-laws in regard to pleasure grounds, cycle parks, baths and washhouses, open spaces and burial grounds, mortuaries and post-mortem rooms, public baths and washhouses', providing public clocks, and a host of other opportunities from traffic calming to crime prevention, and even power to provide gymnasiums, playing fields, holiday camps or provision of boating pools!

As one who has observed the Council at close quarters, as Clerk for five years and subsequently as a reporter of its proceedings, I can testify to the extent of change in recent times, and the advantages of this status for an incoming Council when elections are held in May this year.

Report and public meeting

No news, last month, has turned out to be real news this month- at last!

As readers will be aware, the 'shadow' Trustees have spent the last few months negotiating with the County Council over the possible purchase of the library building. Just seven days before Christmas a response was received from GCC confirming a price which the Trustees feel is reasonable, and including a package for retaining a Council-supported library service.

That price and package has been incorporated into a Prospectus and business plan that

is now with printers. All those interested, and it is hoped that many will be, can pick up a copy from Painswick Library from Saturday next, 11th January and some will be available from the Town Hall office when open. Copies will also be available to those attending Christ Church and St Mary's Church on the Sunday. There is not an unlimited supply, for cost reasons, but it is hoped there will be sufficient for all who have a real concern about the future of the premises, their potential, and existing and future services which could be based there. The prospectus will also be published simultaneously on the Internet at www.painswickgateway.org.uk



The Trustees have done their best and gone to great lengths to set out all the facts surrounding this project in the Prospectus and urge residents not to judge the proposals upon hearsay, but read the report for themselves.

A vote will be taken at this public meeting, and the future of the project depends entirely upon that outcome. The matter is now time-sensitive, so please be there and have your say, and cast your vote. There cannot be another chance.

A46 Closure: 30% impact on local hostelries

A 30% loss in trade for our local eateries: that is the main message from our short informal survey of five businesses in the village where you can eat and drink and, at four of them, also stay the night.

Our intention was to find out how severely the closure of the A46 had affected them as, in part, they all rely on customers from outside Painswick. Our concern was that loss of trade might have been so great that the businesses might be in danger of closing. We can assure our readers however that whilst the owners reported that there has been a marked drop in customer numbers in three of the four enterprises, none of them stated that they were likely to go out of business.

As our readers may know, the Falcon, the Royal Oak and Cotswolds88 (formerly The Painswick Hotel) have all acquired new owners over the past twelve months whilst the Thai Restaurant at Cardynham House has recently changed to a Bistro and St. Michaels opened last year in Victoria Street.

For Cotswolds88hotel, Marchella de Angelis estimates a downturn of about 30% on non-residence business. She points out that people from a little further afield but within the county probably regard access to Painswick as too complicated to contemplate. Unfortunately for the hotel the problems caused by the flood and the road closure coincided exactly with the opening of the hotel and all this after a year's incredibly hard work to renovate and rejuvenate the building and the business.

John Pearson of The Falcon, which employs up to 19 staff in the busy summer months, told the Beacon that customer

A significant loss for him was the removal of Painswick from the itinerary of coach tour companies as the vehicles would have to make a 25 mile detour to continue their tour. Both John at The Falcon and Magda Black of St. Michaels reported a drop in the number of visitors requiring overnight accommodation in Painswick, including, in The Falcon's case, walkers "doing" the Cotswold Way though this is not the case for St. Michaels. Happily, though, Magda and her husband are now at last going on their honeymoon and visiting family on the continent over the next two months.

Shelagh Hume took over The Royal Oak at the end of May this year and, like the others, expected a busy summer. She also reckons that customer numbers have dropped by about 30%.



All four businesses were disrupted by the cutting off of the water supply and coped with it in different ways. Loss of trade for that 16 day period in July/August was bad enough but about a week after the water was declared potable again, Painswick's main road artery to the south was cut off. Shelagh made the point that Painswick had "seemed to fall off the map" and put it down to very confusing signage which sends traffic back towards the motorway and then suddenly stops. Similarly the signage at the Brockworth roundabout needs simplifying.

The only business that has not noticed



a sharp drop in customers is Cardynham House and the new Bistro. John Paterson, the owner, told us that because they do not rely on passing trade, customer numbers had remained much the same though new clients have to be "guided in" when trying to follow the confusing roads signs.

All repeated how grateful they were to



local people for continuing to patronise their establishments. There is no doubt that all would have had a harder time over the past few months had it not been for the support of Painswickians and other locals.

One final thought: when the A46 does finally reopen, how about doing it at a weekend and holding a celebratory event in Painswick. But somebody would have to organize it and pay for it. Any volunteers?



Martin Slinger is Painswickian of the Year

Our Painswickian of the year is Martin Slinger and, as many of you agree, he is a very worthy winner of the title. During the summer floods he was an absolute stalwart as can be seen below, but there is much much more to Martin and his unswerving service to the village over many years.

Born in 1944 Martin has spent nearly all his life at Jenkins Farm following a family tradition in the Painswick area which dates back 300 years. Very much a dairy farmer he left Jenkins Farm four years ago and now works as a herdsman feeding his own cattle and sheep at Edgehill Farm in partnership with his son, Paul. Daughter, Judy, is married to a farmer.

He is, apparently, semi-retired but you would never know it. His stunningly extensive knowledge of the locality, its land and its people, combined with his sheer practicality mean that Martin is usually the first port of call when there is a local emergency or a job to be done. He is often seen around the village, fencing, walling, turfing and carrying out all sorts of repairs for people. He is happy to turn his hand to anything practical. "I was taught all these skills by the old boys years ago," he says. He positively relishes dealing with little local emergencies from plumbing to rescuing straying animals, and according to Mary, his wife of 40 years, he can't say no.

Apart from Martin's genuine willingness to come to the rescue in all these situations he is very actively involved in a variety of local organisations. As a parish councillor since 1994 he is Vice-Chairman of the council, Chairman of the Finance Committee and Chairman of the Cemetery and Parish Maintenance committee. He is a school governor at the Croft School for which he does maintenance work and is known by all the children. He also carries out work at Resthaven and is the local snow-plough driver. He has been interviewed often by Radio Gloucestershire on a range of local subjects, has written over a hundred short stories and led many farm and public walks around the district.

In his younger days Martin attended Hartpury College where he won the Best Practical Student prize. He was in the Cotswolds Farmers team which won the National Tug-o-War title in 1966. Martin's father started the Painswick Show and Martin was the one time Chairman and latterly President when the show finished.

But Martin's commitment to the local community was specifically recognised by those responsible for the flood relief and water distribution when he was given a citation to mark his outstanding contribution in that crisis. Martin worked around

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the clock to ensure that he was always available to unload the cartons of bottled water from the delivery vehicles. He also spent a considerable amount of time with the police in helping them determine those residents with particular needs. The citation was awarded to Martin at a ceremony held on 3rd December in London at Lancaster House. He was one of only eight people from Gloucestershire to be so honoured. He told the Beacon that he had been surprised to have been introduced to the Prime Minister. This happened when the Member of Parliament for Gloucester, Parmjit Dhanda, had suggested to Mr Brown that he might wish to meet the Gloucestershire contingent. Martin said that a number of lessons had been learned during the flooding and water shortage and that those present at Lancaster House had been interested to hear of Painswick Parish Council's Emergency Plan proposals.

For all these reasons and more, ("I'm just an odd-job man"), our readers consider Martin to be a truly deserving winner of Painswickian of the Year. His commitment to the village is unquestionable.

First we heard Beethoven's dramatic Coriolan overture and then Tchaikovsky's violin concerto, one of the great virtuoso works for this instrument, with the brilliant German soloist Christian Tetzlaff holding us spellbound. Snow White Panto Sensation

"...a chilling tale of murderous rivalry, adolescent sexual ripening, poisoned gifts, blood on snow, witchcraft, and ritual cannibalism" is how American author Terri

Windling described Snow White.

As everyone should know, Painswick Players is currently rehearsing the pantomime, *Snow White and the Seven Not Particularly Tall People*, written by Jack Burgess and directed by Lesley Wolowiec, to be staged at the Painswick Centre on Saturday the 2nd February at 2.30 and 7.30 pm and again on Sunday 3rd February at the same times.

We are all familiar with either the Brothers Grimm tale of Snow White or the Walt Disney film. But did you know that the Grimms collected their stories not for children but for adult scholars? They wanted a record of oral storytelling before the tales were lost forever. After their publica-



tion in 1812 the tales were so popular with families and children that all the footnotes and annotations were removed and the stories themselves edited, cleaned up and sometimes rewritten.

So what's so chilling about that? Read the Grimms' Snow White tale right through to the end and you will find out. One version has the wicked stepmother banishing Snow White, seducing a kitchen boy and ordering him to "bring back the girl's eyes and a

bottle of her blood and I'll marry you". The boy abandons the girl in the woods and returns with a lamb's eyes and blood. A band of robbers befriend her, she dies and is brought back to life by a prince's kiss.

Walt Disney changed all this. His cartoon film released in 1937 abandons all the horror of the written versions, only keeping the truly frightening evil stepmother. The dwarves become major players, with individual names and characters, cheerfully singing as they go to work. And it is the Disney version that has inspired Jack Burgess's script. Or in his own words...

"I freely admit to relying on fading childhood memories of seeing the movie on the big screen and also of missing a fair bit it whilst rummaging under the seat trying to retrieve the ice lolly that I'd dropped in fright when the witch first appeared."

This may explain some curious twists to the plot, such as the unexpected appearances of Dick Whittington, a troupe of tap dancing Trolls and chuckle mining in the Last Laugh Mountains of Saccharinia (which is no laughing matter). Not to mention Seven Not Particularly Tall People. Intrigued? All will be revealed on February 2nd (or 3rd).

Aviation History in the Cotswolds

At the November meeting of the Local History Society Graham Pitchfork treated us to an excellent talk that toured the Cotswolds taking us to numerous little airfields that had been used during WWII and even a couple dating back to WWI.

It might not sound much but it was far more than just the physical airfields or the traces that are left of them in some cases. The talk encompassed so many details of events and people associated with particular places: Morton-in-Marsh a training airfield where

the old training Wellingtons were used in the 1000 bomber raid on Munich and Essen in 1942 (and the chilling thought of over 6000 people lost just in training exercises); Little Rissington a training and maintenance unit set up in the 1930's as part of an expansion scheme for the RAF (the Red Arrows were formed here and are commemorated in the window of the local church); Kemble which was the home of the Red Arrows for many years and where 1064 were flown in after the War just to be scrapped; Woodchester where a stained glass window in the church commemorates Robert Alum d1912 the second person to be killed in what was then the Royal Flying Corps; Rudcombe where Bristol fighters were based during WWI.

Many of us felt that driving around in the future we would look differently on these places and make the effort to visit the various stained glass windows mentioned where fascinating little bits of aviation history are recorded.

Richmond Painswick have decided to radically revise their intentions with regard to Phase Three – the final stage of their desired development on the Stroud Road site. Their plans for that stage will be available for public scrutiny, and comment which they will welcome, at their centre on Friday 25th January between 10.00am and 6.00pm.

Some specific concerns were expressed by the District Council, and others, when an application last year was in fact turned down. The Beacon understands that the new proposal is for 12, instead of 16, apartments and that some other changes have been taken on board. Richmond say that they remain committed to try and create these apartments to be "more affordable and available to a wider group". The new configuration will, we are told, comprise "an equal mix of one-bedroom and two-bedroom units, and more attention has been given to the views from these properties".

Susie Oakley, Manager of Richmond Painswick, told us that "The apartments closest to Queens Mead have been re-orientated in order to retain the views from that cul-de-sac, and their roofline has been reduced by two metres". Susie went on to say that further information will be available nearer the 25th and she can be contacted on 813902 when required.
