Painswick welcomes the Olympic Torch

We now know that the Olympic Torch will be carried through Painswick on Wednesday 23rd May, arriving at St Mary's Mead at about 5pm and then on to the Sheepscombe turning opposite The Highlands. There will be four runners for the Painswick leg. Sadly none of the runners will be from Painswick, a disappointment for the Parish Council's nominee. The local committee has been in discussion with the District Council concerning the arrangements for stewarding the expected considerable number of spectators. Painswick has been asked to put forward the names of anyone interested in acting as a steward. If you are interested, please contact Roy Balgobin at the Parish Council Office. The Diamond Jubilee in Painswick

Ideas for celebrating the Diamond Jubilee in early June are now being worked up. The main event is proposed for Sunday June 3rd and will be centred on St. Mary's Church and the churchyard.

11 am civic service in the church – ecumenical and non-denominational; based on the nationally set liturgy

About noon, a photograph, on the lines of the Painswick millennium photo, of all attending (though for road safety reasons the photo will probably be taken from the north aisle roof of the church)

A Big Jubilee Lunch (many communities will be organising such a lunch – the Big Lunch is a national event). This would be largely a "bring and share" event for everyone to join in – lots of detail to be sorted but soundings so far suggest there would be a lot of support.

Ringing of the church bells from 3 pm - all bells across the country will be rung at this time.

Yew Tree Appeal 2012

Would you like to sponser a yew tree and celebrate with a glass of wine or two?

Three years ago your church asked for the support of the local community in preserving our historic Yew Trees and providing help with the maintenance of the church yard. Trees were numbered and offered for sponsorship over a three year period at £99. Much to our delight the offer was oversubscribed and all the trees found sponsors. In addition we received several generous gifts.

The money we received has enabled Saint Mary's church to keep the trees and the grounds well groomed as the cost of maintaining the trees and cutting the grass is £5000 per annum.

Planning Committee

There were no public questions and only two planning matters that required a decision by the Council. After an explanation by the Chairman of the Planning Committee, David Hudson the Council unanimously agreed to support both applications. Councillor Martin Slinger stated that revised drawings had been submitted to Stroud DC for Shepherds Patch in Edge. These had not been passed to the Parish Council for comment. The Chairman agreed to investigate and report back to the Council.

The Clerk advised the Council that from the 1st April the Planning Department of the District Council would no longer provide paper plans with planning applications. All applications would be on line. Plans would be downloaded and displayed on the screen in the Town Hall for Councillors to consider.

Portas Pilot Scheme

Prior to the Council Meeting Terry Parker introduced Carole Garfield, Chair of the Stroud Chamber of Commerce and Trade, who explained Stroud District Council's proposal to be a part of the Portas Scheme Pilot. Mary Portas had carried out a nationwide review of High Streets and had identified 20 points to help create a thriving community. The government had been persuaded to financially support the ideas. It was vital that communities input their own ideas. Communities needed to bid to take part in a pilot scheme. One of the conditions was that it had to be led by a Local Authority, who would form a Town Team that demonstrated "vision and leadership". Carole Garfield wanted to combine Stroud, Dursley, Wotten-under-Edge and Painswick into a Town Team. Two models would be tested;encourage local entrepreneurs to take stalls, once a month, at local markets to test new products. When successful encourage them to move into empty shops – may need support from District Council over rates and discussions with landlords over terms of lease. Secondly support for local festivals by advertising on web sites and production of flyers. Carole gave an example of First Great Western who last year printed special "Stroud Tickets" to bring visitors to the area. Such was the success of the project First Great Western want to repeat the deal again this year and have also asked Stroud to display details of the area on the concourse of Paddington Station in May. Leaflets on Painswick will be included. Stroud, Dursley and Wotten have already agreed to join the bid. As a reply is needed by the 30th March Terry Parker asked the Councillors to indicate their support. There was unanimous agreement and a special meeting will be arranged to ratify the decision. If the bid for Government funding is successful matched funding will be provided by Stroud DC. The pilot will be regularly reviewed and the reports will be made public.

PARISH COUNCIL

Despite the absence of the Chairman's gavel the Parish Council Meeting was conducted in an orderly manner and business was concluded, according to the new clock by shortly after 9.00pm. The Chairman opened the meeting and announced the sad news that Susan Robinson, a former Councillor had died. The Council and members of the public stood in silence as a mark of respect.

New Drive Field

The Chairman advised the Council that he had received a letter, with nine signatories, seeking support from the Council to change the status of the field to a "Village Green". They wished to meet with the Council to discuss this matter. For over 20 years the field had been used by the local community as an area to exercise their dogs, pick fruit from the hedgerows and toboggan after a snow fall. There was also a "public footpath" across the field. The owner had not objected to use by the local community. Councillor Rob Lewis stated that he understood several other local groups were in support of this proposal. The Chairman asked if Councillors would support the proposal to alter the status of the land to a Village Green coupled with an approach to the "Open Space Society". The proposal was carried with two abstentions.

Allotments

Support for the siting of Allotments on the Recreation Ground had been received from the Recreation Ground Trust. The Clerk stressed the need for public consultation to be carried out before any action was taken. The Council needed to consider how the consultation would be carried out-article in the Beacon and details on the Parish Council web site. The period of public consultation would be from the 23rd March to the end of April. This would allow the matter to be formally discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting. The Chairman read out a letter he had received from Dr Boddington withdrawing his application for an allotment. He was concerned that the allotments were to be sited on the Recreation Ground as that site had not been included in the original public consultation.

County Councillors report

Joan Nash reported that the County Council's portion of the Council Tax will be frozen for the coming year. Also, that there are no reductions in care for older people or in the protection of children. £100m of Government and County money will be invested in the County economy. This will include bringing fast broadband to rural areas, £1m help for first time buyers with house deposits, £1m into an opportunities fund to help young people into businesses, 25 apprenticeships with the County Council. More than ten public sector organisations, including our County and the six District Councils, have signed the Local Armed Forces Community Covenant. This is a voluntary statement of mutual support between the Community and the Armed Forces Community.

At the recent annual Highways meeting it was announced that the majority of the budget would be used for massive improvements on the A38 between Gloucester and Bristol. As a result the improvements to both Damsells Lane and Tibbiwell would be delayed until 2013. Work on Golf Course Road will be completed in April/ May and Catswood Lane in June. Joan Nash stated that she was "fighting" the decision to delay work on Damsells Lane.

District Councillors report

Barbara Tait reported that the District Council would be issuing a recycling Wheelie Bin to those householders who wanted them. To improve recycling new containers would be sited, on the 28th March, in Stamages Lane car park. The new containers will accept cardboard. The District Councils portion of the Council Tax will be frozen for the coming year. £1m will be made available to assist first time buyers. An Icelandic bank has now fully refunded the amounts previously deposited by the Council with them.

The Olympic Torch Relay and Queen's Jubilee

The torch will be carried from St Marys Mead to the Sheepscombe turning by a team of four runners, a journey of only 14 minutes. Unfortunately the Council's nominated torch bearer had not been chosen. In addition to the flags and bunting supplied by the Council, the District Council will fund a bundle of Olympic flags. The Council expressed concern over possible overcrowding on the narrow New Street and also problems with car parking. May need to park on the Recreation Ground. A final decision has yet to be made over whether or not to close the A46 whilst the torch convoy travels from Stroud to Brockworth.

Volunteers are needed to act as Stewards or Marshalls on the day. For further details see article in the Beacon. Councillor Martin Slinger announced that it had been agreed that the Jubilee Beacon would be alongside the Blow Family Memorial in Sevenleaze Lane. Also that the District Council had allocated money specifically for Street cleaning before the Jubilee celebrations.

Yew Tree Sponsorship

The Council agreed to continue to sponsor a Yew Tree in St Mary's churchyard.



Tourist Information Centre

The Council accepted the draft agreement which let the TIC occupy the front part of the Parish Council Offices. The Chairman read a letter that had been received from Mrs Anne Smith, Chairman of the TIC. The letter thanked the Council for agreeing to the arrangement and for their continued support. The TIC would be open for five and a half days per week but if there were sufficient volunteers this could increase to seven days.

Internal Auditor

The Council accepted the recommendation to appoint Mr Ian Crowe FCA as the Council's Internal Auditor for the year ended 31st March 2012.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish meeting will be held on Wednesday 2nd May in the Town Hall at 7.30pm.

It's an opportunity to hear reports from, and raise issues with County, District and Parish Councillors.

Everyone welcome.

Ward Reports

Councillor Ann Burgess-Watson recommended that "Street Cleaning" signs were needed. Currently it was difficult to clean the streets due to parked cars. The County Council would supply the signs, which would be permanently attached to lampposts. Cleaning dates would be marked on and on completion rubbed off.

Councillor Burgess-Watson also queried whether or not "Painswick Matters" was still operating. Councillor Rob Lewis stated that it was not defunct and was closely allied to the Art Festivals.

The Chairman queried why the Falcon Hotel appeared to have removed the Jerningham Coat of Arms from the premises. The Clerk will contact the Hotel.

The Clerk confirmed that the Blow



Estate had paid the outstanding account and that a Standing Order had been set up from 1st April each year to collect the amount due.

The Clerk suggested that a letter be sent to the Contractors thanking them for the standard of work carried out on the Town Hall. This was agreed.

Councillor Ann Daniels suggested that the curtains in the ground floor hall needed to be replaced.

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2 Ps in a Pod!

Painswick Rococo Garden, famous for being a sole survivor from the 18th century Rococo period, is now home to a monthly gardening programme. Hosted by Paul Moir and Paul Hervey-Brookes the programme is called '2 Ps in a Pod'. Paul Moir has been instrumental in the restoration at Painswick since the project began over 25 years ago. He is joined by Paul Hervey-Brookes, a well respected garden designer and plantsman, who has been involved with the Garden for over 5 years. The two Pauls have said that the aim of the programme is to give hands on, seasonal tips based on the gardening year as it unfolds in this unique setting. The Wildlife of West Wales



Our 8th. March meeting was addressed by a much

travelled member, Mike Robinson conducting us on a wonderful excursion to view 'The Wildlife of West Wales !' We first saw the imposing profile of the Severn Bridge before pursuing the South Wales littoral to historic St. David's. At once came a giant leap across the principality to Kenfig Pool and Dunes with its rich array of waders on the water and the colour richness of yellow loosestrife, less common in Celtic lands. The next huge stride was to Llanelli for its reed beds and salt marsh with white delight, the little egret in photographic pride of place, then the magnificence of the limestone stacks, ledges stuffed with guillemots and razorbills. Then were the Havens with the colour extravaganza of blooming gorse and heather before dropping south to the wilderness of Skomer Island with more razorbills and puffins ~ on to the huge nocturnal thrill of rushing thousands of Manx shearwaters returning to their burrows, so cumbersome on land but mostly escaping gull cull! Finally we came to St. David's and rat-free Ramsey Island with returned puffins and the like now safe in their burrows. The talk was followed by the Club's Annual general meeting.

The Countryside Agency has confirmed that Painswick is the first parish in the South West to complete a parish plan.

Wake up Painswick Leonard Chittenden writes:

Over the next few weeks the Parish Council will be conducting a public consultation regarding their proposal to site 20 allotments on Painswick Recreation Ground. This will be of direct concern to residents who regularly use the Rec to exercise their dogs, practice their golf swings, play with their grandchildren or simply as a place for quiet contemplation. However it should concern all residents. One very fundamental issue to consider is whether an area of the Rec should be fenced off for the exclusive use of just 20 people.

One letter in the last issue of The Beacon outlined this and other concerns, whilst another painted an idyllic vision of families gardening together. Others take the view that over a period of time, the allotments would fall into disuse, become an eyesore and attract vandalism. It very important that your readers, whether for or against the proposal, make their views known in the forthcoming public consultation.

The Development of Georgian Gloucester

The talk this month was given by Dr. Nicholas Herbert, who has been responsible for editing the Gloucestershire Victoria County History and many other publications. He described the development of Gloucester as a busy trading centre, after the beginning of the 18th century. The city had contracted to within its historic city walls, when its suburbs were demolished



as part of the Civil War defences. In the 17th century the layout of the city was essentially medieval, with market shambles and unsavoury activities occupying prominent locations on the main thoroughfares.

The population only grew significantly after 1750 when, as a result of various Improvement Acts, the markets were relocated, roads improved and the city gates

removed to facilitate transport access. At this time Gloucester was virtually self sufficient, with all manner of industrial uses in the courts behind the main frontages, including tanneries, maltings and glass making. The city expanded and tried to compete with Cheltenham as a spa, when mineral springs were



found c1814. However, the increasingly industrial nature of the city, with its expanding new docks and warehouses, meant that it lost popularity to the more select town of Cheltenham.

Although, a number of the City's fine buildings were demolished as a result of

Painswick is not only the first community library in the county but also the first to start from scratch, in a new building, which has never been used as a library before! By the time this edition of the Beacon lands on your mat the furniture should be installed, books will be ready and waiting to be added to the GCC catalogue and



there should be a pile of book jackets, date labels and other accessories ready for our enthusiastic volunteers to start on the behind- the- scenes work.

The CLIP Trustees have also considered when the library will be open to the public. The survey which went to all households in Painswick last summer indicated Friday, Saturday and Wednesday would be the most convenient to most people. It was also requested there should be some evening opening and that hours should be consistent. Taking all these issues into account our initial proposition is to open on Wednesdays and Fridays from 10am to 1pm and 3pm to 6pm. Plus Saturday from 10am to 1pm. We also intend to introduce a range of other activities on days or at

times when the library is not open to the public – for example events for children or a computer club.

Starting with 15 hours a week gives us time to settle into our roles before we train more volunteers and open for a further six hours a week. Although we know there are many people enthusiastic and willing to help we don't feel we can presume on their goodwill by expecting too much too soon. David Archard treated us to one of his great presentations of Painswick's history, illustrated with some of his excellent photographs of the town taken throughout the last century. We learned much about





School Inspection

Contrary to some expectations, the W.I's February meeting was not a production of the classic Priestley play 'An Inspector Calls', but a potted history of the schools inspection system, traced from the early 19th century through till the late 20th century, given by Alan Callendar, himself a retired Schools Inspector. He had spent his career as an



Inspector travelling the length and breadth of the country visiting schools, and was able to use a wealth of anecdotes, and jokes involving remarks made by children - school dinners, parents and teachers being the most favourite and obvious targets - to enhance his talk.

In the 1800's, school teachers were paid according to results, thus their income was dependent on the achievement of their pupils, and standards in reading and arithmetic were high, despite the huge classes, often up to 70 pupils, that were to be found in some schools. Absenteeism is not a new problem either. Because so many families lived on the poverty line, seasonal work such as fruit picking was an opportunity for some such families to increase their income, although by present day standards by very little, by sending the children to work during the summer months, rather than attending school. Each school was inspected at the same time of year every year, so there was no chance of a school being caught on the hop by a Man from the Ministry! Sadly, the policy of the 19th century to teach children practical, usefuls skills, such as cookery or carpentry, in preparation for finding work 'in service' or as tradesmen, has radically changed in the meantime. At the next W.I's meeting, on 24th April, all will be revealed when Jilly Baker will give a talk entitled 'A World of Lingerie'.

effort and sheer hard work for purely selfless ends certainly deserve our congratulations and applause. *Carol Maxwell*




The Stroudwater Textile Industry and Painswick Mills

Susan Mary Holden Robinson, neé Tincker

Susan was born in Painswick in 17th April 1929. Her father Robert Tincker was the village doctor and he moved with his wife Kathleen from Byefield House to Beaconsfield House shortly before she was born. Beaconsfield House played the role of the perfect village doctor's setting for the next 45 years, home and surgery combined. During the Second World War Doctor Tincker was imprisoned in a Japanese POW camp and Susan found herself playing surrogate father to her three younger sisters. They speak fondly of her during this difficult time and Janet, her youngest sister, remembers Susan carrying her on her back to the top of the Beacon to celebrate the declaration of the end of the war.

On leaving St Mary & St Anne school in Abbots Bromley Susan followed her father into the medical profession and trained as a physiotherapist in Edinburgh and practised in Gloucester and Oxford. She was by this time a very beautiful young lady and was eventually wooed by Eric Robinson from the well known Bristol family. He was the third Eric to seek her attention and her younger sisters found it amusing to ask "which one" when he telephoned, "first, second, or third?"

Susan married Eric at St Marys and then started a family in Kent but soon moved back to the area to live at Ham Court near Cheltenham where she spent most of her free time working voluntarily for Riding For The Disabled, SOS Children's Villages and a local children's playgroup. The playgroup was in fact her own which she set up and ran from home. Susan and Eric returned to Painswick in 1984. Eric died in 1986 and thereafter Susan busied herself as a member on the Cheltenham Community Health Council, Trustee to The Painswick Institute and The Frederick Gyde Trust, Painswick Parish Councillor, and in the tradition of her parents who were both active councillors for most of their life in Painswick she stood for District Councillor in 1988.

Recognising that her Parkinsonism would likely dominate the latter part of her life she was the first to buy an apartment at the newly built Richmond Village in 2006. Her charisma and humour shone through right to the end. She suffered a stroke on Monday 12th March soon after a witty exchange on the benefits of homemade marmalade with her carers. She died on the 16th in the peaceful and ideal setting at Richmond Village with her three children, Gail, Laurence and Kate present. She had nine grandchildren and one great grandchild. 



Painswick Mini and Junior RFC


The second half of the season, from January through to the end of April, is centred around the age group cup competitions, playing sides from across the county, to progress into a set of finals. Painswick has done well this



Support local girl's bid for Yorkshire 3 Peaks challenge in aid of Anthony Nolan

Priyana Sen will take part in the Yorkshire 3 Peaks Challenge this April in aid of Anthony Nolan, the charity that saves the lives of people with blood cancer who need a blood stem cell, or bone marrow, transplant.

Priyana, a medical student from Painswick decided to represent Anthony Nolan because it is "simply the only chance of survival for most people who have been diagnosed with blood cancer." Anthony Nolan helps two people every day in need of a lifesaving transplant by using their Register to find donors who have matching stem cells, but for every person helped



there is another who sadly can't be helped, because no match can be found. Anthony Nolan desperately needs increased funding to be able to recruit more donors to join the Register. Priyana feels so strongly about this cause that she has been recruited to the Marrow Committee in York

Commenting on the challenge ahead, Priyana, 22 said "I must admit that I am nervous as it's a long time since I've done something like this, but I know that every minute of it will bring the charity one step closer to saving more lives." The Yorkshire 3 peaks is a very demanding but rewarding walk, which takes in the summits of Pen-y-ghent (694 metres - 2,276 feet), Whernside (736 metres - 2,415 feet) and Ingleborough (723 metres 2,372 feet) all in one circular route. Forty other students from the Hull-York Medical School will join her in the challenge.

On average, 65 people a day in the UK are diagnosed with a blood cancer – that's one person every 23 minutes. There are currently over 400,000 people on the Anthony Nolan register, but the charity would like to raise funds so that they can grow this to one million potential donors. If you need further information you are more than welcome to contact Priyana at ps699@york.ac.uk The last two month's articles have been about support available for memory loss and dementia. I have been asked by a parishioner to look at what we can do to help ourselves or the one we care for, given that there is a diagnosis of dementia. Another reader said that he found it



upsetting to keep reading about this subject and understandably so, as it is an area of mental health that can be very scary and confusing. However, let's look at the positive things that can be done.

It's essential to get a diagnosis (which is not always easy) as soon as possible, and start taking the appropriate medication. Not only can the medication slow down the process of dementia but it can help alleviate distressing symptoms such as hallucinations. Having a diagnosis of dementia should not prevent you making your own choices about how you live. There are clear benefits for remaining in your own home – especially as you may feel happier and more in control there. With the right help and support, you may be able to stay independent for a long time. There is support available with help in the home, with personal care, or day care if appropriate. You will be eligible for benefits such as Attendance Allowance which will help pay for the extra care required.

'Assistive technology' means any product or service that helps you to remain independent. It can be something as simple as a walking stick or as advanced as satellite technology to find you if you are lost. You can get advice from social services or occupational therapists about what might be useful for you. Telecare, a remotely operated care system, links sensors around your home to a call centre by a telephone line. The sensors monitor movement in your home and alert the centre when things might be going wrong. For example, sensors might be able to detect if you fall. They can also help by automatically turning a light on when you get up in the night. Memory aids include devices such as recorded messages that remind you to take your keys when you open the front door. Or medication boxes might beep to remind you to take your medicine at the right time. Tracking devices can help you feel safer when out and about. You carry the device with you, and most have a button to press if you get lost

It is important to understand that there will come a time when it won't be possible to cope on your own and so to look into how and where you want to live. A lasting power of attorney (which has replaced an enduring power of attorney) allows you to choose someone to manage your affairs in future. You can choose one or more people to manage your property and financial affairs, and also to make personal and welfare decisions for you. You can make a lasting power of attorney if you already have a diagnosis of dementia, as long as you can show that you understand it and its legal significance.

Keeping up regular exercise is important and is known to improve mood. Repetitive exercise such as walking and cycling and activities such as folding laundry can reduce anxiety because the person doesn't have to think what to do next. A good diet is important with lots of fruit and vegetables and "brain food" such as oily fish". Try to drink plenty of fluids and as a carer or family/friend, encourage the person to drink regularly. "Post-its" can come into their own as a very helpful memory jogger. Keep tasks simple and clear and use as much routine as possible. Vary activities to stimulate the different senses, such as singing, walking outdoors to hear the birds and smell the flowers.
