

2014 Elections

Voting day Thursday 22nd May

Elections for the European Parliament and Stroud District Council are to be held on Thursday 22nd May2014. European Parliament

There are 754 Members of the European Parliament (MEPs) with 73 United Kingdom representatives. The UK is divided into 12 regions. Each region has between 3 and 10 MEPs. Painswick lies in the South West region which has six members. MEPs are elected under a proportional representation system called the 'closed party list'. Each party puts forward a list of candidates and you vote once for a party or an independent candidate. The MEPs are then allocated to the parties and independent candidates based on their share of the votes. Elections to the European Parliament are held every five years.

Stroud District Council

The District Council has 51 seats of which one third retires in each of three years, but in the fourth year the County Council elections are contested. Painswick has two District Council seats. 2014 sees the election of a Councillor to one of the two seats. Unlike the European Elections, the District Council Elections are held under the 'First-past-the-post' system where a Councillor is elected by a simple majority.

The District Council has recently resolved that with effect from 2016 the Council will follow the County Council's procedure and elect all 51 Councillors at the same election.

Painswick Parish Council

There is no Parish Council Election this year. The Council was elected in 2012 for a four-year period. The next election will therefore coincide with that of the District Council in May 2016.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 16th April by Terry Parker

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Matters arising from the meeting held 2nd April

District Council had confirmed that planning consent was not required for the Catbrain Quarry. Committee Chairman Cllr Rob Lewis, reported that the District Council had stated that planning consent was not required for the crane as it was regarded as a mobile construction.

Reseeding. Cllr Lewis said that no application had yet been received by the District Council for the reseeding of the quarry face.

Matters requiring decision

Court House, Hale Lane. Application for the demolition of existing garages and erection of 7 garages with store over. The Committee resolved to object to this application because the members believed that the height of the proposed storage areas above the garages would be out of keeping with the surrounding properties. Mandalay, Denbury and Rake Hill: land fronting Golf Course Road. Application for consent to carry out works on Common Land in accordance with the Commons Act 2006, Section 23. The members were opposed to the fencing of this land, one reason being the difficulties being experienced by vehicles seeking to pass now that the passing areas lay within the fenced area.

Application for the construction of a riding arena on land at Haines Green, Edge Road. Cllr Slinger said that the arena could not been seen from Painswick. The members agreed to support the application with the proviso that the arena was restricted to private use and that appropriately coloured materials were used.

PARISH COUNCIL

Public questions

David Allott asked what progress had been made with the implementation of the traffic speed monitoring scheme. Cllr Lewis responded that the responsibility for the monitoring now lay with the Gloucestershire Road Safety Partnership.

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The County Council had stated that there was a requirement for the Parish Council to specify the locations where the portable sign was to be positioned. It was intended to have a site visit to identify the appropriate locations. Alan Hudson had been given permission by Cllr Lewis to ask the same question prior to the meeting of the Planning Committee.

Painswick Pavilion Project. The opening of the pavilion was planned for the 14th June.

Village Post Boxes. There was no progress to report. Cllr Bullingham said that the Member of Parliament had made a number of representations to Post Office Limited

The Post Office. The Clerk to the Council, Roy Balgobin, said that the Parish Council and the Painswick Centre were continuing to seek the provision of a Post Office Local.

County Councillor's report.

Cllr Bullingham said that the County Council was seeking to resolve the considerable inconvenience caused to older people and those with disabilities who were unable to use their concessionary bus passes before 9.30 in the morning. Cllr Bullingham said that he had asked for action to be taken to infill the deep pothole at the bottom of Gloucester Street. Cllr Slinger said that the pothole posed a particular problem for ambulance drivers where the stability of patients was a high priority.

District Councillor's repor

Cllr Nigel Cooper reported that with effect from 2016 all District Councillors would be elected at the same election. Currently the Council elects one third of the Councillors in any one year during a four year period. County Council Elections are held in the fourth year. He said that he expected the Local Government Boundary Review to recommend a reduction in the number of District Councillors with changes to District Ward boundaries.

Painswick Pavilion.

the name recently agreed by the Parish Council be changed from "Painswick Pavilion" to "Painswick Youth Pavilion". This prompted a lengthy discussion with some Councillors expressing the opinion that the use of the Pavilion should have a degree of flexibility which could allow its use by other, not necessarily, youth organisations. Several Councillors supported the User Group's proposal. The discussion concluded with a proposal by Cllr Ann Daniels that the name be changed to the "Painswick Youth and Community Centre". The Clerk explained that, because the Council had agreed the name "Painswick Pavilion" within the preceding six months, it would require Standing Orders to be suspended in order to consider changing the name. The members then resolved to suspend Standing Orders and Cllr Daniels' proposal was agreed by 6 votes to 3 with one abstention. The Chairman undertook to explain the Councillors' reasoning to the members of the Pavilion User Group.

A letter had been received from members

of the Pavilion User Group asking that

The Clerk then referred to an email from a Stonehouse resident querying the status of the Painswick and Stroud Local Area Ministries (PSALMS) Painswick project. She stated that she had read in a booklet issued by PSALMS that they were developing a £150,000 Youth Project in Painswick. She requested details of the Parish Council's involvement with the project. The Clerk said that he had explained that the Parish Council had set up a management committee in which PSALMS, the Parish Council, the Painswick Football Club each had two representatives together with two "general" representatives. In answer to the question whether the Youth facility at the pavilion would be run in a secular manner in accordance with County Council regulations, the Clerk had replied that "the youth services in Painswick are open to any youth parishioner no matter what religion, colour, gender or disability".

St Mary's Churchyard maintenance

The Finance & General Purposes Committee had received a letter from the

Parochial Church Council stating that because the churchyard was now considered "Closed", the PCC requested that in accordance with the Local Government Act of 1972 the maintenance of the churchyard become the responsibility of the Local Authority. The F&GP Committee mindful of the Act had considered three options. One was to allow the District Council to take over the maintenance of the churchyard. The second was for the Parish Council to assume responsibility for the maintenance and the third for the Parish Council to work with the PCC to find a resolution to the financial constraints encountered by the PCC.

The committee had discussed the options at length and, noting that the maintenance costs were in excess of £10k per annum, resolved to recommend the third option. The committee also agreed to recommend to the Parish Council that the Parish Handyman assume responsibility for the grass cutting and that the PCC continue to pay for the remainder of the churchyard maintenance and that the Council withdrew its grant to the PCC. In order to allow the Handyman the time to work on the churchyard, the Wards' grass cutting would be undertaken by contractors. The proposal was to be subject to a time and motion study. The Parish Council approved the Committee's recommendations.

Ward reports.

Gloucester Street. Concern was expressed by Councillors about the deep holes at the bottom of the street.

New Street. Similar concern was expressed about the wobbly drain cover outside the Patchwork Mouse.

Slad. The Manorial Land at Slad was to be an agenda item at the May meeting.

Sheepscombe. Cllr James reported that several burglaries had occurred recently and that the police were to give a talk at the Village Hall on 29th April.

Arts Festival. The Clerk reported that the same terms regarding car parking on the Recreation Ground had been agreed with the Festival organisers.



Painswick 1914

At the March research evening the society was treated to two excellent presentations.

To commemorate his birth Barbara Blatchley gave an illustrated talk about the filming of Laurie Lee's Cider With Rosie and a look at his character – while his daughter viewed him as 'a complicated character' Barbara thought of him in



terms of a jester - comparable to Alexander Pope or Noel Coward - he could often be found 'holding court' in the Woolpack. We were reminded of things that fashioned his life; seeing and following two young children being taken to the workhouse; the schoolmistress rapping the desk with her ruler; his beloved Slad Valley which he overlooks from his final resting place in Slad Churchyard. We then heard a recording of Laurie reciting two of his poems and a third sung by Johnny Coppen.

Carol Maxwell looked at the Belgian Refugees who came to Painswick during the First World War. From the outset of the war the language and visuals of propaganda could be seen in Punch Cartoons depicting 'the rape of Belgium', in sermons justifying the war and newspaper articles exhorting our men to enlist. The scale of devastation in Belgium left one million refugees of which a quarter came to Britain. Across the country committees were set up and Painswick had its own. We have some early reports but sadly little beyond the first eighteen months. Some refugees were put up with families while others were in houses on their own - details gleaned from the Girl's School admissions book. The committee saw also to the provision of a depot supplying food and clothing and arrangements for work. Notably a furniture making business was set up in Kings Mill along with a couple of tailors. A lasting memorial of the Belgian Refugees is the carved screen in St Mary's Church with the Roll of Honour and list of all those from Painswick who served during the war. The presentation concluded with a poignant look at photographs of some of the Painswick men who gave their lives.

The next meeting on 20th May is the annual outing, this year to Sharpness Docks, a coach is leaving Stamages Lane car park around 5pm. (Contact David Harley 813150 to check if there are spare seats)

County Councillors Monthly Report

Concessionary Bus Pass - Review

Gloucestershire County Council recently renegotiated a concessionary fare agreement with Stagecoach. The arrangement allows elderly people, or people with a physical or learning disability, to travel for free on Stagecoach buses after 9:30am.

Members were told that time restraints had posed problems for some people when attending medical appointments or getting into work on time so the council has resolved to look into the issues that are affecting the elderly and disabled.

Following the full council meeting, held on Wednesday 19th March 2014, it was unanimously decided to review this arrangement.

Extra Funding - Gloucestershire Schools

GCC have warmly welcomed the Government announcement of extra funding for Gloucestershire schools. The announcement in the House of Commons will mean an extra £9.6m in funding for schools in our county, as part of a package of measures announced to boost cash for poorly funded areas. Gloucestershire County Council has been lobbying for many years for extra funding for county schools.

The Arts and Crafts Movement

The Arts and Crafts Movement flourished in Britain between 1860 and 1910. At the WI meeting on 25th March Dr. Frances Wilson-Copp showed us how this became one of the most influential, profound and far- reaching design movements of modern times. It stood for hand craftsmanship using simple forms and often medieval, romantic, gothic or folk styles of decoration. Taking three of the most active proponents of this style the speaker illustrated their work with colourful and striking slides.



Dante Gabriel Rossetti was an illustrator and his work was full of sensuality and medieval revivalism. This splendid colourist used pure reds and greens. Lizzie Sidall was his muse and model and eventually his wife. His powerful close up images of her and other models became stylized with distinctive large eyes, cupid bow lips, red flowing hair but with a strong jaw line.

Edward Burne-Jones became a friend of William Morris at Oxford and he was influenced by Rossetti's work. However, his golden colours were subtler and his women were more refined. The detailed cartoons drawn in preparation for his work on stained glass windows for churches have a strong design and are outstanding. In his later life he designed many tapestries.

In 1861 William Morris founded his decorative arts firm. He researched and executed everything for himself from weaving to furniture, architecture, wallpaper, fabrics and tapestries. He wanted things to be individual and affordable and his glowing designs using natural subjects are perpetuated today by Sanderson and Sons and Liberty of London.

The skill of Dr. Wilson-Copp in presenting this wide range of colour and design left the audience wishing to see and learn more about this very creative Arts and Crafts Movement and to explore the many excellent examples to be found locally.

At the WI meeting on the 27th May Brian Partridge will give a talk entitled "You Cannot be Serious".

Forest of Dean



"On April 8th in the Town Hall at a joint meeting of the Painswick

Beacon Conservation Group and of the Club, Andrew Bluett of Gloucestershire Naturalists' Society talked proudly of the Forest of Dean, his birthplace, recounting the great saga at all levels from the bowels of the earth to hill heights beneath the green mantle over the centuries.

First the Romans dug for iron, then came stone recovery, latterly coal for 18-1900s ironworks. Undermining the Scots at Berwick had led to commoners' rights within the Royal Forest, then curtailed by enclosures leading to poverty and the Forest Riots. Rights and rites remain for foresters and free miners, thus the burgeoning Dilke – even tent labours! Deer and boar also remain but the 'hunt' is not now for the Royals but for nature lovers in mixed woodland – surprisedly peering through suspended stained glass before sighting pied flycatchers, redstarts, wood warblers and hawfinches at RSPB Nagsheador at height, spying peregrines or goshawks (GB's greatest concentration) This was a tiny fraction of his comprehensive account of the Forest – a fascinating flavour by way of introduction for the Club visit to the Woorgreens Nature Reserve - imminent at the time of writing.

A further foray will be to Sherborne Water Meadows, guided by Martin Wright on Tuesday 13th May at 10.00am to observe summer visitors in various habitats (meet at NT car park on road from Sherborne to Clapton on the Hill: SP176155)"

ZERO SIX PAPA TWO (Painswick Fire Engine's Call Sign)

06P2 was called to a house fire on a sunny Sunday afternoon to assist crews from Stroud and Nailsworth. Painswick crew was instructed to take a 'command support role', setting up cordons and carrying out risk assessments to maintain an acceptable and managed level of safety at the scene. We were then involved providing welfare to the breathing apparatus crews who had been working in particularly hot and difficult conditions to extinguish the fire while other members of our crew also were checking for potential fire spread into the neighbouring property, using a thermal imaging camera. In this case the owners were out when the fire took hold and sadly the house was severely damaged by fire. Please ensure you turn all electrical appliances and portable heating appliances off when you leave home.

We were also called to a grass fire on the edge of Painswick Beacon. The crew arrived just as the fire had reached the edge of farmland. Thankfully especially now we are approaching the drier time of year.

As part of our First Person On Scene (FPOS) advanced first aid training Chris Garbett and Mark Hancock completed their eventful 12 hour secondment to the South West Ambulance Service to work as paramedics' assistants. Mark Hancock also completed his two day structural firefighting course designed to assess the ability of firefighters to rescue casualties in a hot, smoke filled real fire environment. The course takes place in a series of interconnecting steel shipping containers in which fires have been lit and training casualties placed.

We are always looking for enthusiastic men and women from all walks of life to join our team. Review of Painswick Music Society's Concerts

The Chamber Philharmonic of Europe on the 29 March.

The Chamber Philharmonic of Europe came to St Mary's Painswick on 29th March with a group of string players along with a trumpeter and gave us a concert in two parts: first music from the Baroque period and then three romantics to make a nicely balanced afternoon.

They began with a Vivaldi concerto followed by an Albinoni Trumpet Concerto whose deceptively subdued introduction hit us with its 'wow' factor of virtuoso playing by soloist Kirill Gusarov. Highlights after the interval were Holst's St Paul's Suite and Grieg's Holberg Suite with nice changes from the crisp opening Allegro via a suitably subdued Andante religioso to a humorous finale.

Then the pieces de resistance. First Krilli Gusarov's rollicking trumpet encore and then the whole group with an amazing collection of interwoven popular classics with changes every few bars to keep us on our toes: it brought the house down. A memorable afternoon.

Angela Hewitt on the 12th April

The second concert of the Painswick Music Society's season was given by the world-renowned Anglo-Canadian pianist, Angela Hewitt. First, Haydn's Andante and variations in F minor, a piece with masses of notes and the clarity of this performance let us hear every single one of them. This was followed by Beethoven's Sonata op 2 no2, and both were a masterclass for any pianist brave enough to take them on.

The second half began with Bach's English Suite in G minor played with great flair and precision: we expected an authoritative performance and were not disappointed. Then came this week's tour de force, Liszt's Dante Sonata. This got off to a rousing start and maintained it for over 15 minutes: a virtuoso piece to end all virtuoso pieces and in over 25 years of the society's concerts, I can remember no other performance which has so inspired the audience.

Korngold



How is it possible that such an extraordinarily talented musician can have remained relatively little known or at any rate virtually forgotten in the world of serious music? Erudite and charming as always, Gordon Collins,

playing many lovely recordings on 3rd April, made his case: the man was a genius as Mahler had said reviewing Korngold's early works, supported by Richard Strauss and Puccini and other prominent musicians.

In the first half of his presentation, we heard classical orchestral and chamber music, "Lieder" and songs from his opera "Die tote Stadt". The film soundtracks in the second half showed Korngold's astonishing leap into the film world for which he wrote music scores that became mainstays of cinematic art. It is for this that he is mainly remembered nowadays.

To finish on a high note, we were treated to the supreme interpretation by Jascha Heifetz in the first movement of Korngold's Violin Concerto, a masterpiece which draws its material largely from his film scores and which, incidentally, can be heard in this year's Three Choirs Festival in Worcester as also the Piano Quintet. An evening to remember!

The Proms

Next, Mike Kerton on 17th April tracing a cheerful history of The Proms, our great seasonal classical music festival at London's Royal Albert Hall –all about Henry Wood, famous conductors like Adrian Boult, Malcolm Sargent and Thomas Beecham, ups and downs especially in war time, financial worries and strong will ensuring enduring survival and popular acclaim. We heard classical recordings followed by the well known audience endings – Rule Britannia, Jerusalem, Pomp & Circumstances and Land of Hope and Glory - happy and quite sentimental!

Painswick's Walking Groups

Want to walk with other local people and enjoy the Painswick Valley's fantastic scenery? This brief summary outlines opportunities in Painswick and gives details of the new Thursday Health Walks.

Saturday Walking Group

Last September, Pippa Dickinson and Helene Hewitt announced that they were forming a small group of people to go walking on Saturday mornings once a month. Although aimed at working people, they welcome anyone who would like to join them on a brisk walk of about 2 hours' duration. They meet in Stamages Lane car park on the 2nd Saturday of each month at 10 am (check the Diary to confirm the date). Any questions contact Pippa (812965) or Helene (814112), evenings or weekends. They are happy to welcome well-behaved dogs on leads although dog owners should be aware that they may need to lift their dog over the more difficult stiles.

Monday Morning Walkers

The Monday Morning Walkers is a long-standing 'institution' which meets every Monday (except Christmas Day and Boxing Day) at 10 am in Stamages Lane Car Park. We walk for about $2 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ hours (4 - 5 miles) depending upon weather and ground conditions. A few walkers who need to return home sooner than the main group, peel off to return to Painswick separately. New walkers are always welcome; contact either Jane Rowe (813228) or Hywel James (812419) How They Work

The Monday and Saturday Morning Walking Groups have much in common: no membership, no subscription and no insurance. We ask that each participant accepts responsibility for their own safety. Pippa and Helene take turns to lead the monthly group. On the Monday walks, the leaders vary with Hywel James and Jane Rowe usually selecting routes, or in their absence, someone stepping in with an idea. There is no requirement to walk every week/month; simply fit them around other commitments. Both groups use the Parish's extensive footpath network, which means that stiles and hills, some steep, are inevitable. Walking boots or similar suitable footwear are recommended, especially in muddy conditions, plus clothing and waterproofs appropriate to the weather. Many walkers use one or two walking poles for stability.

One-hour Guided Health Walks

In last month's Beacon, I announced the first of the new weekly Health Walks in Painswick. Due to the original choice of day clashing with another commitment, I need to change the time and date of the new Health Walks. They will now begin at 2 pm on Tuesdays. I will be using mainly stile-free routes around the village, with the occasional hill. Please meet at Painswick Town Hall at 1.45 pm most Tuesday afternoons. For more information, please contact me on tel. 813228; otherwise, just turn up. Bring a waterproof in case of rain and a bottle of water, and please wear sturdy footwear.

Footpath Inspectors

Painswick Parish Council would welcome more volunteers to help share the work of inspecting the Parish footpath network and to report on any problems. The results of the Inspectors' work are discussed by the Council's Rural Environment Committee. For example, the Parish Council is asking the Footpath Inspectors to suggest paths that would benefit from dog friendly stiles. Philip's photographs of the Eyjafjallajökull volcanic eruption in 2010 reminded the audience of another type of hazard, when the resulting ash cloud across European airspace caused massive disruption to air travel.



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
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Badminton

Long Quarry. The return of large numbers of flowers and butterflies to Long Quarry is now assured! Painswick Beacon Conservation Group (PBCG) volunteers, with considerable help from a band of Cotswold Wardens and three chainsaws, worked three long sessions in Long Quarry during April. Huge quantities of tree

tops were cut up and burned. Usable firewood logs were stacked ready for removal to storage and seasoning. As the photographs show, the whole valley has been opened up to the sun. We now expect a return of the flowers and butterflies for which it was renowned. Of course it won't happen in one year; meanwhile we shall be creating the

scrapes and sowing the juniper seeds as part of the deal with No. 3 London Gin, who contributed £1,000 and started the whole project last autumn.







Water. Pipeline Logistics are installing permanent water supplies to the grazing paddocks on the Beacon. You may have already seen their trenches and 'moleing'. The project is being managed by Mike Hoey, President of Painswick Golf Club, who has put in many volunteer hours and has accumulated a heap of bureaucratic paperwork for his pains. It is financed partly from private donations but mostly from the public purse. The bulk of the money comes from a Biffa grant (recycling Landfill Taxes) with another chunk from Natural England (DEFRA money). When completed it will be largely unseen, apart from a water trough in the paddock currently being grazed. Spring on the Farm


The grass in the fields is starting to grow and we've added fertilizer, so it's now time to let the cows out from the barns. It has been hard work bringing hay in to feed them twice a day every day through the winter but we don't want to put them out too soon. If the grass is not growing, they will just eat all that's there. So we need to be sure, as we say, that "the grass is growing behind them"

The cattle get very frisky, charging around, tails up when they are put out but we have to watch that they do not react to the sudden change of diet. Changing from hay to lush green grass may cause grass staggers (magnesium deficiency) or bloat (too much clover). If any show symptoms we have only a couple of hours to get treatment to them, or they may die.

We have finished chain harrowing to rake out the old grass and leveling the lumps and rolling to flatten the bumps and push in the stones. Dock is a problem weed. One plant can produce 60, 000 seeds a year which can remain in the ground for up to four years before germinating. The plant takes up a litre of water a day, causes havoc in hay and silage, goes straight through a cow's digestive system and has a very low feed value. So we will have to spray the worst affected fields.

If, however, you are booked in for treatment at Oncology and are waiting your turn, which may take a while, you can always tell Oncology Reception that you're popping into Maggie's and ask them to contact Maggie's direct, when they are ready for you. This can be very useful if you use public or hospital transport and have arrived early. It also works for carer's. If as a carer, you are waiting at Maggie's while the person you care for is having treatment, and because the treatment can often take longer than expected, Oncology can phone through to tell you when they are ready. You just need to tell the Reception Desk first.

Maggie's is a charity and all their services are free. Their programme is provided by a team of Cancer Support Specialists and the following is a guide to what you will find on offer - Benefits Advice, Stress Reduction and Relaxation, Managing Hair Loss, Tai Chi, Yoga, Nutrition Advice and even a Creative Writing afternoon.

Maggie's also offer a range of courses and classes ranging from practical help with benefits, or how to cope with hair loss; emotional support through bereavement group or one to one sessions, Tai Chi, self-help imagery exercises and social support by providing a very warm and welcoming place to meet and chat.

As well as all this, there are networking and support groups which include breast care, head and neck, lymphoma and brain tumour groups. You may even feel that a group should be set up on another type of cancer - this is all possible.

What makes Maggie's so special is its relaxing and homely atmosphere, it's a lovely place to go and sit, look through the library, or just somewhere which is quiet.

Maggie's address is: The Lodge, College Baths Road, Cheltenham, GL53 7QB. It is just a 2 to 3 minute walk from the Oncology Centre along College Bath Road. You can't miss it. For more information ring Maggie's: 01242 250611

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Exciting new project at the Rococo Garden

Nettie Edwards has recently embarked on an exciting project based in the Bothy at the Rococo Garden. Funded by the Arts Council for a year, she will be experimenting with a photographic art technique called anthotypes. This involves using plant dyes, sunlight and photographic images.

Nettie has been a frequent visitor to the Garden for many years and is pleased to have a project which makes use of all aspects of the site. Interested in historic photographic techniques she is keen to explore ways to produce prints using alternative and historic processes. Anthotypes is one such, invented in 1842 by John Herschel. Plant matter is pulped to produce a dye which is transferred to paper. A photographic image on acetate is placed on top of the paper and exposed to the sun to produce the print in varying shades of the single dye.

This is a very 'green' technique which has a limited life-span. The resulting pictures however, are lovely, very subtle and slightly ethereal. As Nettie says, the process is definitely experimental and a little unpredictable but often with beautiful results. Her intention is to produce pictures of the Garden, which she will send out worldwide, and to work collaboratively with Steve, the head gardener, to discuss which plants are immediately available throughout the seasons - an element of spontaneity alongside the predictable. Trained as a theatrical designer, Nettie worked for 25 years for the BBC, the Royal Court and the National Theatre. She then started her own community creative practice working with traveller families and her photographs featured in several major exhibitions. She taught herself digital art, explored the creative possibilities and was one of the first to have her work displayed at the famous Fox-Talbot Museum. She takes commissions, teaches, and sells and exhibits her work worldwide.

Nettie will be working on Mondays and Tuesdays at the Rococo Garden with the last Monday of each month being open studio when visitors are welcome to observe the work in progress.

Reducing Speeding in Painswick

In 2009 the average vehicle speed in Gloucester Street was 21.8 mph. In 2013 the average was 24 mph. Clearly vehicle speeds have increased since the introduction of the 20 mph zone. Would restoring the 30 mph limit reduce traffic speeds? There would certainly be a reduction in speeding offences. Currently 4 out of every 5 motorists exceed the 20 mph limit. Restoring the limit to 30 mph would reduce this to less than one in 10, a reduction in offending rates of over 70%! A reduction on this scale is something Gloucestershire County Council and the Highway Authority could be truly proud.
