Farewell Number 46 – new Stagecoach bus route

Today (November 1st) sees the end of an era when the last 46 Stagecoach Bus leaves Painswick. The 46 is to be replaced by the 61 which will have a changed route. The new route will provide an hourly service during the daytime on Mondays to Saturdays from Cheltenham to Dursley via Brockworth, Painswick, Stroud, Ebley, Stonehouse and Cambridge. Stagecoach report that new journeys will be introduced on Saturday evenings between Cheltenham and Stroud. Most journeys will connect with the new Service 63 for connections to Nailsworth and Forest Green. The 63 replaces Service 46 between Stroud and Forest Green plus the whole of Service 93. The new route will operate every 30 minutes during the daytime on Mondays to Saturdays. There will also be journeys up to every

hour on Sundays School journeys on service 504 will be incorporated into the new timetable. Every hour journeys will connect with new Service 61 at Stroud, Merry. walks for connections to Cheltenham. The



route between Gloucester, Stroud and Nailsworth will match that of the former 93 Gloucester, Stroud, Nailsworth service.

There will be disappointment that the 46 is to be replaced by the 61. There can be few if any bus services that carry the same number as the road on which they operate (A46). The 46 has been the Cheltenham – Stroud route number since Stagecoach became the operators. There are a number of other changes to bus routes in the Stroud and South Gloucester area. Stagecoach report that the changes are probably the most significant for more than 30 years. Simple timetables for the changed routes are available on the Stagecoach website www.stagecoachbus.com/west or from Painswick Community Library.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS 15th October by Terry Parker

Reports upon meetings of the Parish Council cannot help but be selective, if only because of space constraints. We try to highlight points of widest public interest, based upon what we see and hear.

The full minutes of Council and committee meetings are available for scrutiny at the Council's office.

PLANNING COMMITTEE

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Ben Nicholls, Roey Parker, Abigail Smith, Emma Smith and Caroline White.

The members agreed to recommend the following applications for consent:

- 2 Painswick Heights, Yokehouse Lane. Single storey extension to dwelling
- Flat 18, Gyde House. Provision of two bedrooms and shower room in existing roof space with conservation roof lights. New staircase and new front door. The members took into account the concerns expressed by a resident.
- Fielden, Slad Road, Slad. Demolition of attached garage and replacement with two storey extension to provide additional living accommodation.
- 4 Court Orchard. Erection of two dwellings. The issue of drainage was to be addressed.
- Shetlands, Far End, Sheepscombe. Extension and alterations to a listed cottage
- Amesbury, 3 Vicarage Street. Replacement of 3 windows.
- Stonecroft, Sheepscombe. Fell 6 x Norway Spruce.
- Revised plan for Meadow Cottage, Kingsmead. Demolition of existing house and two garages. Construction of replacement dwelling, double garage and linked study wing. The members considered the details of the revised plan but resolved to maintain their objections and recommendation for refusal.

PARISH COUNCIL

Public Questions

There were none.

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors Ben Nicholls, Roey Parker, Abigail Smith and Emma Smith.

Matters of urgency

The Chairman referred to the substantial donation received by St Mary's Church towards the restoration of the Gravedigger's Hut. As result there was no requirement to seek a grant from the Lottery Fund.

County Councillor's report

In his written report, Councillor Bullingham referred to the award of a £9,700 grant



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from the Lottery Fund's Sharing Heritage programme. The grant will support the Gloucestershire Libraries Remembers project which will include a series of events and displays to commemorate World War One across the county over the next three years. Councillor Bullingham also referred to the need to support the A417 Loop Solution. He reported that central government would make its decision on funding for the A417 Loop in May 2015.

Councillor Ian James referred to the recent fatal accident on the A417 and said that a petition which called for government action was being prepared.

District Councillor's report

Councillor Julie Job spoke of the parish council's concerns regarding fireworks and said that she would be asking for tighter regulations at a District Council meeting to be held the following day. Councillor Rob Lewis said there was a requirement for a qualified person to ignite explosive fireworks. Councillor Job asked why the Parish Council was to exclude members of the press and public from the "Potential Post office for Painswick agenda item".

Councillor David Oxendale explained that the reason for confidentiality was not a Parish Council requirement but that of the Royal Mail. The Clerk to the Council said that the position remained unchanged from that reported in the October issue of the Painswick Beacon. This was that discussions were taking place to provide an "Outreach" facility which required a location at which a post office service would be provided for a weekly minimum of 15 hours. Councillor Job said that the Stroud Member of Parliament had written to the Royal Mail seeking the reinstatement of a central post box. It was pointed out that the closure of the post office box changed the criteria and strengthened the case for the new box.

Rural Environment Committee

The Council agreed to approve a budget of £500 per annum to be set aside for a programme to replace stiles with Kissing Gates. It was also agreed to "top up" the Plantation fund.

Traffic Committee Working GroupCouncillor Abigail Smith had submitted a

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written report. GCC traffic surveys. These had been completed at the 5 locations agreed at the September Parish Council meeting. The results were awaited. Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS). The sign that had been purchased with Bisley Parish Council was now back in Painswick, charged up and ready for trial at the end of the month. Emergency Access Signs. 4 had been ordered and were due to arrive that week. They would be put up along Vicarage Street. The attachments associated with the signs enabled the signs to be moved to new locations as required.

The Love Painswick Business Group.

Councillor Oxendale reported that he had been appointed Chairman of the group in succession to Councillor Abigail Smith. The group was encompassing community organisations as well as businesses. A meeting had been held on 2nd October to discuss the creation of a brand name for Painswick. A working party was to meet in November to progress the name. Visitor Surveys were to be carried out during the winter months.

Ward reports

Councillor Martin Slinger said that he had written a report about stormwater problems at Edge. Councillor Ann Daniels reported that the foliage had been cut back alongside the footpath between The Croft and the school. Councillor Ian James reported that the stream barrier opposite the Village Hall had collapsed and that the road alongside the hall was in a poor state.

Meeting closure

The meeting open to the public closed at 8.30pm.

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
Grand Attic Picture Sale Friday 7th November, Painswick Centre

Police Report

Sexual Offences: A substantiated sexual assault was reported during the month. Police enquiries are ongoing into the offence.

Burglary There was one dwelling burglary reported on 17/09/2014.

Entry was gained to a property by the removal a glazed unit from a window frame. A semi untidy search was conducted and articles of property stolen. Enquiries are ongoing into this offence.

Theft (Motor Vehicles): There were three substantiated thefts from motor vehicles during the month. These thefts occurred at PAINSWICK Beacon and near BULLS CROSS on 31/08/14 and in PAINSWICK on September 11th 2014. All the offences remain undetected at this time.

Theft: There was one attempted theft from an automated machine at STAMAGES Lane Car Park on 02/09/2014. No entry was gained and at present this crime remains undetected pending further evidence coming to light. Criminal Damage: There was one report of criminal damage to a motor vehicle in PAINSWICK Town on 26/09/2014. Police enquiries are ongoing into the offence.

With the clocks going back and with the darker evenings fast approaching, homeowners are reminded to consider their home security. A house in

darkness will often attract

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a potential burglar and there are a range of security measures that can be considered including timing switches for lights and audio equipment.

Zero Six Papa Two (Painswick Fire Engine's Call Sign)

November is traditionally the month of bonfires and fireworks. If you are building a bonfire make sure it is on level open ground with plenty of space around it and no overhanging trees. Put a chicken wire fence around it stop wildlife using it as a home and check it for wildlife and hiding pets before it is lit. Light it on one side only to allow any roosting birds or other wildlife a chance to escape.

If you are going to have a firework party, always follow the instructions on the box and store fireworks in a metal tin. Be especially careful with sparklers and small children as sparklers burn at temperatures between 1000°C and 2000°C and can easily set fire to clothes. Alcohol, bonfires and fireworks don't mix and remember fireworks at home carry a far greater risk of injury. Professionally organized displays are much more spectacular and less risky.

The fire crew from Painswick was recently involved in a large Hazmat (hazardous materials) exercise at Gloucester South Fire Station with fire crews from across Gloucestershire. The purpose of the exercise was to check our knowledge of operational and decontamination procedures when hazardous chemicals are found when attending an incident.

We would like to say a warm welcome to James Wheatley who joined us as a new recruit in September and is currently undergoing his basic training. He should be an operational on-call firefighter by early December and should be a fully competent firefighter toward the end of 2016.

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Painswick Community Speed Watch – up and running

As one of a suite of measures being pursued to improve speed awareness through Painswick, 15 volunteers came together on Thursday 9th October to be given training in the use of speed detection equipment by PC Dave Wood and PCSO Colin Drewett. After a comprehensive session on the required health and safety considerations, the group were given hands-on training with the equipment, which they will have put into action during the week commencing 27th October.

The data collected by the group will be passed on to police who will review it for repeat offenders and those significantly exceeding the limit, to whom they will write or visit. The Painswick Parish Council Traffic Committee and associated Working Group will use the data to canvass the police to provide additional enforcement activity where speeds limits are shown to be consistently exceeded. Further, the gathered data will be used in our ongoing discussions with Gloucestershire County Council highways regarding additional speed control measures, e.g. upgrade of signage/lining, installation of Vehicle Activated Signs.

Many thanks is extended to both the volunteers involved in this latest community action and to the police for their support with training and provision of the equipment.

Can you name three everyday items invented and made in Stroud district? The lawnmower? The green baize for snooker tables? But what about the non-flammable material that was used in the fuselage of Concord and in the suit worn by Niki Lauda, helping to save his life when he crashed during a race? Or how about the adjustable spanner, the lightning conductor, a material that is used in open heart surgery, or the world's first 3D printed bicycle?

Stroud district's long and distinguished track record in manufacturing and engineering goes un-noticed amongst its residents, yet nearly 24% of people living here work in this sector in some way. The creativity and innovation that makes this area one of the industrial powerhouses of the UK is celebrated during Festomane, 24th – 29th November. It's a week-long festival of events highlighting achievements past and present which was started by Neil Carmichael MP, and Neil and his staff still provide the co-ordinating role for organising the festival.

On Monday the 24th, the 'Creation and Innovation Revealed' Exhibition at Stratford Park Leisure Centre gives you the chance to meet some of the innovative companies based in the district, and learn more about what they do. At the Museum in the Park on Wednesday, the 26th, the spotlight falls is on our history: alongside displays compiled by local history societies will be a special preview of the Redler's Collection, prior to a major exhibition next year. A special talk in the evening discusses the history of Dursley's Mawdsley Mill, and how past industry is still with us today. Rural Jottings - Autumn

My daughter-in-law calls me out because the cattle are bawling in the field but she cannot see them. When I get out there I find two cows calling on one side of the hedge and their six month old calves calling on the other side! Eventually the calves give in and walk the fifty yards down to the gate to join their mothers. All quiet now!

The weather is turning towards autumn and, although the grass is still growing, it is of low quality. Out in the fields you can always tell when this time of year comes – the animals are restless, start eating hedges and shout when they see you. So it is time to start winter feeding. If they start losing weight it costs a lot of money to replace and bring the animal back up to good health.

I gave a short talk at the village Harvest Supper the other night, off the cuff, about the past and present. In the sixties we made about ten thousand small bales, of hay and straw, nearly all handled by hand in and out of the barns. Then we had helpers joining us to do the job so there was camaraderie. Now, the big bales of hay, silage and straw are handled by machine all by one person, or with another tractor and driver in the field with you, in the distance. These big, round bales are ten times the size of the small ones; and the very large, square "six stringers" just over twenty small bales.

It can get lonely driving long hours and your mind and concentration start to wander. This is partly why there is a high suicide rate amongst farmers. We listen to the tractor radio and keep in contact on the mobile phone. One of the reasons mobile phones were, and are, used in farming to keep in touch with each other, check everything is OK, call for help when there are breakdowns and so on. I spoke of the first new tractor we bought in 1972. It cost us £1,700. The equivalent tractor now would not give us much change from £20,000.

Report from Hambutts Field Trust The Trust has been approached twice during 2014 by the Parish Council, at the

request of village dog owners, to see if we would accept the installation of a larger dog bin at the entrance to the field from Edge Lane. At our meeting in March "The Trustees were against this, as it reinforces the impression that the field is simply the village toilet for dogs" (I quote from the minutes of our meeting). Recently the Parish Council were sent a photograph of the bin, which was obviously full, with several plastic bags of dog excrement left on the ground below it. I understand that bags have also been hung on bushes, and that one bag was thrown over the garden wall of a house by the field. Obviously this is not acceptable. However, the Parish Council do not have sufficient funds to empty the bin more than once a week. The Trustees do not wish to install a larger dog bin because as a registered charity we have specific environmental/conservation/heritage charitable purposes, and these do not include providing a dog toilet. We have in the past grazed National Trust cattle in the field, and may do so again. We are currently establishing a wildflower meadow in the middle of the field.

Therefore, if the dog bin is full, dog owners should please take their bags of excrement home with them and dispose of them in their own bins, just as they would do if they had been walking elsewhere in the village. On behalf of all the Trustees, may I thank them for their cooperation and support in this?

13th November; a date to remember!

Painswick Beacon Conservation Group will be hosting an important meeting after the brisk AGM at 7.30 p.m. on Thursday 13th in the Church Rooms, off Stamages Lane, car park.

With several expert speakers we will cover a range of topics:

- What PBCG is for and how you might help - How Edge Common (also known as Scottsquar Hill or Rudge Hill Common) has been hugely improved and shows how Painswick Beacon can follow suit. (Paul Griffiths).
- How the meadows can be improved by seed collection and distribution (Katherine Holmes of the Cotswolds AONB'S Magnificent Meadows team)
- How the number of Junipers on the Beacon is being doubled. (Tim Wilkins of Plantlife)
- How the Duke of Burgundy, and Large Blue butterflies are being helped by the planting of 1,000 cowslips and 350 Wild Thyme. (Polly Lillico of Butterfly Conservation.)
- How the woodlands can be improved to produce excellent habitats plus firewood and charcoal.
- And also a Question and Answer session.

The cattle on the Beacon have vastly improved the paddock (known as No. 4) to the west and north of the Hillfort. The grass is now short and they have also enjoyed eating most of the "weeds" and the leaves of unwanted ash and sycamore self-sown trees. Last Thursday, 23rd October, our "four-legged mowers" moved east towards Cheltenham to pasture new (Paddock 2) occupying the Southern ramparts of the hillfort as far as the Cotswolds Trail. They will stay there almost till Christmas or until the feed is all gone or weather too frightful.

Elsewhere the Saturday work parties have been planting wild thyme, reducing the competition of other trees and bushes round the older junipers, and, mostly clearing unwanted ash and sycamore from "should-be" flowery grass areas. One of the perks of being a workparty slasher is free firewood; - predominately ash. Come and join us, and help yourself. Dates are Saturdays November 8th and 22nd, December 6th and 20th. See the Village Diary. If you are a keen rose grower do help yourself to the quantities of cow dung in the used paddocks. Natural England aims to reduce the fertility of the limestone grassland so you can please them as well as your plants. A win-win situation?

In the June edition of the Beacon County Councillor Bullingham was reported as saying that the 20mph speed limit was not enforceable. In the October edition Parish Councillor Smith was reported as saying the 20mph limit was enforceable. Would it not be reasonable for Cllr Bullingham and Cllr Smith to agree whether our 20mph limit is enforceable and to work together to achieve an effective 20mph limit?

20mph Zone update

Councillor Abigail Smith has sent this response to Mr Munro.

- 1. A traffic regulation order is in place for the 20mph zone.
- 2. I am awaiting a copy of the report on associated signage from GCC (I have a meeting with Daniel Tiffney to discuss next week) but there is nothing to suggest the current signage would prevent the 20mph zone being enforced.
- 3. Having spoken to PC Dave Wood, the local police have speed detection equipment that can be used to enforce 20mph limits.
- 4. The local police will enforce the zone if there is evidence that it is being persistently and significantly exceeded. PC Wood suggested a speed in excess

of 28mph would class as such, although it is not currently clear whether this would need to be the average speed or a percentile. I



aim to use the Community Speed Watch data and recent GCC traffic survey data to test the criteria and make then case for enforcement action within the 20mph zone.

A Summer Supper and "Hugely Huggable"

Wedding hats, fascinators, sun hats, sporting caps and a jester's hat sported by members added a light hearted touch to the proceedings at the delicious summer supper held at The Falcon on 26th August.

At the September meeting Dr. Gillian White gave a well -researched presentation on the history of the teddy bear. Instead of the soft and fluffy approach expected we were treated to a clearly delivered account of how the teddy bear fitted into the history of the twentieth century.

The teddy bear was named after the former US President Theodore "Teddy" Roosevelt Jr. because he sportingly refused to shoot a cub on a bear hunting trip in 1902. This became the topic of a political cartoon and Maurice Michtom saw the drawing and created and mass- produced cute, stuffed, toy bears. Simultaneously Margarete and nephew Richard Steiff developed the famous tawny, plush mohair bear in Germany.

Bears have been the most popular gifts for children and adults to signify comfort, love, congratulations and sympathy. A black, mourning bear was given to people affected by the Titanic disaster in 1912 and bears in uniform accompanied soldiers going to the Front in WW1.

Since then many of our favourite bears have been made in man-made fabrics and many colours such as Winnie the Pooh, Rupert, Sooty, Paddington and the current Pudsey. John Betjeman took his teddy bear to Magdalen College with him because it made him feel "safe". The teddies that accompanied members to our meeting probably played this role in their owner's lives!

At the 10th Birthday meeting on November 25th the AGM will be held and Mark Cum-

mings, the Presenter on Radio Gloucestershire and Columnist on Cotswold Life, will speak.

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habitat, migration, peculiarities and extent of survival, crowning each with excellent reproduction of their songs.



A trek around Annapurna

by Richard and Ann Burges Watson

I found this description amongst my late husband's papers and thought it relevant given the fact that this walk has been so much in the news of late. I have added some details from my own account of the trip below Richard's. ARBW.

Richard

In October, 1988 Ann and I did a 12-day trek from Pokhara, following the Marsyangdi River from Dumre, round to the North of the Annapurnas, to Muktinath and Jomsom—about 120 miles. This was the route recommended to me by Nepal's leading geographer, Harkar Gurung, as providing the widest scenic and ethnic diversity. We started at about 1500 feet, in lush rice fields at a steamy 80 degrees, walking through prosperous Gurung villages and meeting many ex- and serving Gurkha soldiers. In these villages, the Brahmins still held a high position: in one they claimed to have been there for 30 generations.

After five days of walking, and climbing about 5,000ft, we came to the Manang District, inhabited mainly by people of Tibetan origin and much less fertile, except along the river banks. Higher still, the poverty became greater, with the inhabitants complaining about the harshness of their lives and the lack of help from the Nepalese Government. Decades earlier, this had been the base for the Kompa tribesmen, who had waged a guerrilla war against the Chinese in Tibet; they were eventually put down by the Nepalese Army. Now, it is the base of the Manangis, who exploited their rights to free trading to become Nepal's leading smugglers. Part of the area is still closed to foreigners, although a few are now admitted to hunt blue sheep and (unofficially) snow leopards. All the officials on whom we called were friendly and helpful. They told us that they had very few visits from officials or Ministers, although they had had a recent visit from The King.

Near Manang, at Braga, there is a fine old monastery, with a large collection of ancient weapons, reflecting perhaps the instability of the area. The Buddhism practised there was of the Tantric variety, incorporating mystical practices which had preceded Buddhism. At Manang, the last small town up the river, there is an outpost of the Himalayan Rescue Association, warning trekkers about altitude sickness, and providing medical attention for the locals and their animals. They did a valuable job in very tough conditions, sleeping in tents on local rooftops (back in Kathmandu, I was able to arrange for them to be properly housed). On the penultimate day of our trek, we crossed the Thorong La, a pass at some 17,750 feet, the upward climb by moonlight in a temperature of minus 20, before dropping down to Muktinath and Jomsom. Officials, there, who had themselves never been to Manang, said that I was probably the first Ambassador to make the crossing. Near Jomsom, there is a Bonpo monastery, another relic of pre-Buddhist religions.

Ann continues

I note from my own letters about the trip that we set off at 3.20 a.m. having been awakened (however we had not slept) with bed tea at 2.30 a.m. I lit my hand-warmer and was very glad of it. We climbed up to the pass, which was not all that steep, but we felt the altitude. We had brilliant moonlight and we could see the mountains very clearly. Psychologically, it was a good idea to climb in the dark as it was too cold to stop and too dark to take pictures, but the moonlight enabled us to see where we were going so we just kept plodding on to the top. On arrival the sun bathed the peaks on either side in pink morning light at around 6.50 a.m. The cameras did not work as the shutters did not like the cold. I felt very disorientated although we had been acclimatising for the previous 9 days. I noted that our team had run our supplies down to reduce their weight so had we got caught in bad weather and had to retreat we would have had to go a long way down to find food. In Jomsom we had hot showers – our first opportunity to bathe properly since a hot spring dip some 9 days earlier!

Our Farming Heritage



At the October meeting

of the society Paul Griffiths gave a truly compelling presentation on traditional agricultural methods and tools. Having spent all his life involved in farming locally and with very considerable knowledge of the subject, Paul ensured that this was a slice of very significant local history.

Progressing through the seasonal tasks Paul explained the work involved, the techniques used and the tools required, producing fine examples of the latter with each explanation. Winter wood cutting and stone walling, spring hedge cutting and laying using local techniques, June haymaking with huge scythes followed by pitching into ricks and cutting into blocks, corn harvesting, autumn fruit picking and ploughing were just some examples.

All of this was very labour intensive and very hard manual work. It did allow, however, for a sound ecological system to exist in tandem with agricultural procedures, unlike today's fast, machine-driven farming scene. As Paul explained, land management has different priorities now – and it has all happened in our lifetime.

Illustrated with his fascinating collection of tools and very aptly interspersed with locally relevant poems from the likes of Frank Mansell, this was a most informative and riveting piece of local history.

At the next meeting on Tuesday, 18 November, Phil Moss will give a presentation on Gloucester Castle and Prison – a very topical subject at present and one with which many of our Painswick ancestors were perhaps unfortunately a little too familiar. Croft School, 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome.

As I write this article, the sunny Indian summer has ended abruptly and so I thought it would be helpful to look at schemes available to help us stay warmer this winter.

The Council backed Warm and Well advice line has been helping people tackle their energy

bills and make their homes more comfortable for over 10 years. Since 2001, they've given advice and provided grants to thousands of households in Gloucestershire helping them to stay warm and well.

In certain areas of Gloucestershire, if you're on specific benefits or over the age of 60, you may even be able to receive financial support for installing loft and cavity wall insulation. Even if you're not eligible for a grant, you can still get advice.

If you're worried that your home is particularly inefficient and wastes a lot of energy, they have local qualified assessors who can carry out a Green Deal Assessment on your home as a way of giving your home a health check to ensure it is doing all it should and is fit for purpose. You may need one of these assessments if you are looking to access funding.

Recently myself and other colleagues helped out at a "pop up" dementia shop in Stroud which ran for 2 days. It had been organised through "Fair shares" and anyone could come in and get advice and information regarding memory loss and dementia. It was a great success and I hope that we can do more of these types of events Fair shares is a brilliant scheme whereby you can access a "time bank". Time banking is a system of two way volunteering; for every hour of your time you put in, you earn



an hour of help in return.

They have been organising wheelchair friendly/dementia friendly walks at Stratford Park in Stroud. Trained walk leaders will help those who need assistance but if you need a carer, they should come too. November's dates are Friday's 7th and

21st, meeting at 10.30 outside the Museum in the park for tea and coffee for an 11 a.m. set off and if the weather is bad, there will be an inside activity.

The Alzheimer's Society has a lot going on too which might interest some of you. There is an art group held in Gloucester on Tuesdays 10.30-12.30, Nov 4th and 18th and Dec 2nd, 16th and 30th. The Gloucester Directions Group is for those with loved ones in care and they meet on a Monday, 11.30 onwards on Nov 3rd and Dec1st with an optional lunch to follow. Finally, "Good 2 Go" is a support group for working age adults with dementia, their family and carers. They will be meeting Nov 26th, 11.30 onwards with an optional lunch to follow.

Carers Gloucestershire are running their "Positive Caring programme" for 6 weeks on a Tuesday morning from November 11th through to December 12th. Help can be given to get replacement care and transport if necessary.

We are again looking for one to use this year, There are few requirements, but our being able to scan within A4 size, or receive copy by e-mail of a photo-


graph in high definition, are important. Essentially, a seasonal scene in a central part of the village is what we are after. We return any original, so can you help please?
