A46 road closure

A road closure is in place on the A46 at the Pincot Lane / Wragg Castle Lane junction, Painswick.

Report from Gloucestershire County Highways: "On 7th March 2024 a hole was found beneath the road. Technical inspections were carried out and the road was closed for safety reasons as cracks have also been found at this location. We are working to investigate the source of the problem and make the road safe again as soon as possible. Until we know more about the extent of the damage, we cannot estimate when the road will be reopened."



Using different investigation methods we have so far been able to determine that there do not appear to be any

further significant voids, but that the ground is cracking significantly below the East carriageway towards Stroud. This cracking, the voiding, and the slight deformation of the embankment between the A46 and Pincot Lane suggests that the ground is moving and in need of stabilisation. An area of standing water in the field to the west of the A46 will be drained to enable us to inspect the stream culvert which flows under the A46 and Pincot Lane. We will be looking for damage or collapse of the culvert which may have led to the voiding in the verge and carriageway.

Bus Services diverted

Bus Services 66, 166 & C59X Disruption11th March - 8th April

Due to an emergency road closure, Painswick is unable to be served by Services 66, 166 and C59X. These services are unable to serve any bus stops between Brockworth Painswick Road and the junction of the A46 and A4173 near Pitchcombe.

Service 66 will divert via the A4173 through Pitchcombe & Edge and then along Upton Lane and Winnycroft resuming the normal route at Matson Corncroft Lane.

Need for quick response

- this time round

Following on from the 2 year partial closure at Broadham Sue Williams,our County Council representative, has been meeting with the relevant County Council representatives expressing the urgency to resolve the problems. Her report is on the Parish Council Web Site. Sue has emphasized the need for temporary traffic lights as soon as possible once the nature of the repairs have been determined. Improved diversion signage was also requested to keep traffic off this part of the A46.



Speedwatch Cameras

On the left is a summary of February's statistics from the police.

As a reminder, there is a maximum number of letters that can be sent each week, so these figures don't represent all that were recorded exceeding the limit, just those that were written to etc, which represent the top repeat offenders (as sorted by greatest speed).

Anecdotally, a rise in pace cars has been noted, ie those setting the speed for those behind them. This might link to the residents who have told me that they

are now more mindful of the cameras and therefore their speed. We are still optimising the operation of these cameras and I am happy to provide further statistics as we receive them.

I was also pleased to relaunch Community SpeedWatch within the 20mph using mobile cameras. This was initiated with thanks to those with concerns about speed in these particular areas stepping forward to participate. The 50+ registrations collected will also be provided to the police for warning letters to be issued. This additional visible action really helps build Painswick's reputation as being speed aware, hopefully imprinting on those regularly driving through our village.

Driving Safely for Longer



On 29th Feb 2024, Nigel and Alexandra Lloyd-Jones presented "Driving Safely for Longer". Driving is vital for the independence of older people enabling them to sustain their mobility and encourage good mental health. Some 90% of accidents involve human error. A

significant proportion of fatalities are pedestrians or cyclists.

A biannual eye test is important and mobility tests can be revealing, as reactions can be 22 times slower in old age. Of this audience only 4 had read the new Highway Code, where there is considerable emphasis on pedestrians, cyclists, and horse-riders all of whom now have priority over vehicledrivers. Cyclists are allowed to ride 2 abreast, and drivers overtaking must give them a wide birth, temporarily crossing a double white line if necessary. When passing a horse the overtaking speed should be under 10 mph.

Vehicle maintenance is as important as ever, notwithstanding the low annual mileage of some senior drivers. Tyre checks, demisting function, screen-wash and battery charge all contribute to a safe journey.

Poor journey planning can lead to distraction while navigating. Weather is also an important factor so journey planning, is important to avoid floods and similar hazards.

Pedestrian injury is now down by 60 per cent in 20mph zones. The most dangerous manoeuvre is turning right at a "T" junction, where most collisions arise. 20-25 % of fatalities involve motorcyclists.

Finally, most fatalities occur within 5 miles of home, so concentration during driving is key, throughout every journey. *Mike Steed & Henry Hall*

Painswick Surgery Patient Group (PPG)



News from the Painswick Practice

The Patient Group held its first meeting of the year in February, too late for an entry in the March Beacon, I'm afraid. As usual we received an update from the Practice's senior partner Dr Rhys Evans.

But first we heard from Millie who told us about her role. She is a Health Care Assistant taking bloods, carrying out hypertension, blood pressure checks, ECGs, annual vaccinations and other annual checks. She also reviews people's exercise and alcohol intakes. If you find her looking after you, make her welcome!

Dr Evans reported a number of initiatives that have cut their energy overheads by 25%. There has also been a focus on using all staff to support hard-pressed doctors to the full to ensure the maximum number of appointments can be maintained. This has enabled them to deal with 60 patients in a daily triage when 25 is the expected maximum. (For more information on this see the PPG section of the Practice's website or our minutes in the Waiting Room.)

Two 'junior doctors' – qualified but still in further training – are due to join in August further boosting the Practice's capacity.

Some clarification on repeat prescriptions

The standard advice is to use the NHS app, but members reported this to be very unreliable, if so it is preferred that you email the Surgery. If you have requested a repeat prescription you should be able to collect from the Pharmacy, after 48 hrs, often much sooner.

Friends & Family test

All patients are encouraged to complete this NHS form after a consultation on paper, the Practice's website or even by text and the PPG reviewed the anonymised comments received over the last six months. It was noted that all but one were very positive and that the other had been responded to by the Practice.

Pharmacy First

Painswick Pharmacy is underway with this scheme now – another attempt to reduce pressure on Surgeries. Record sharing between the two is expected to be implemented in due course. The Pharmacist is authorised to treat earache, impetigo, shingles, insect bites, sinusitis, sore throat and uncomplicated urinary tract infections in women.

Dimitri Shostakovich and Gustav Holst



Dimitri Shostakovich walked a tightrope in Stalinist Soviet Union. Awarded the highest state honours he yet lived under the constant threat of annihilation.

John Herbert presented a selection of excerpts which spanned the dark days of the Leningrad Symphony to the witty and tuneful Jazz and Gadfly Suites. Chamber music referenced the Piano Quintet,

Piano Trio and the String Quartets and he did not ignore the operas, difficult for many of us, particular Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk which nearly transported Dimitri to Siberia or worse. One wonders why he did not defect to the West as did his son Maxim (a noted conductor): perhaps the safety of his family particularly his daughter Galina was a factor. He survived Stalin which is more than did his compatriot Prokofiev who died on the same day in 1953 as the dictator!

On March 14th Laura Kinnear of the Holst Victorian House ensured we celebrated in style the 150th anniversary of Cheltenham born Gustavus Theodore Von Holst. It is sad that the music establishment often posthumously ignores great composers and Holst is a case in point. There has been very little concert scheduling at the Henry Wood Proms and sadly the Three Choirs Festival. There is some attempt at rectifying this situation in 2024 but over the years there have mainly been spasmodic performances of The Planets and the St Paul Suite. The Holst Birth Museum skilfully countered this inertia by reimagining the Cheltenham address and Laura now presides over the Holst Victorian House with emphasis on the tenure of the Von Holst family in the 1870s displaying artefacts relating to the composer including artwork by his uncle Theodore, a romantic painter.

Laura's emphasis was on the life of Gustav and she provided some rare extracts of his music. Altogether a wonderfully detailed and reassuring presentation.

Painswick Music Society



Painswick Music Society opened their 78th season of concerts at St Mary's on Saturday 16th March with a first PMS recital featuring a harp, delivered by the pre-eminent Welsh harpist Catrin Finch and the leading Irish violinist Aoife Ni Bhrian.

A 200 strong audience was soon immersed in the distinctive and beautiful sound world created by these two virtuosi. The classically familiar sound of a JS Bach violin partita was underpinned by warm bass notes of the harp which then enchanted the ear with its bell like clarity in the upper registers. However, this was not Bach as we know it. St Mary's was taken on a journey of adaptation and development that provided an exciting opening to the concert.

The programme continued based on the duo's award-winning collection of

compositions "Double You". The audience was treated to pieces founded in both Irish and Welsh folk music traditions but taken on a unique journey by the compositional skills of these two musicians who were clearly enjoying their music as much as the audience.

Irish and Welsh melodies (Galway Bay, Give Me Your Hand, The Ash Tree) were recognised but it was the distinctive rhythms of these folk traditions that gave the music its enervating character including the folk rhythms of Brittany and Canada.

Aoife delighted the audience with a description of her personal musical journey and then discussed and displayed her exquisite Norwegian fiddle decorated with mother of pearl and delicate ornamentation. 4 top strings and a further set below allow her to create the reverberated sound exhibited in several of the compositions. Catrin then explained the workings of her magnificent harp with its 47 strings and 7 pedals which create the chromaticism that gives the instrument its extraordinary range and tone.

A happy bond between audience and musicians continued to the final works. These exhibited the duo's ability to improvise in the gypsy like pieces of enervating excitement and the weaving of melancholy with euphoria within the complex multi layered composition "Why".

Called back by the thunderous applause, a final and lovely quiet song was delivered to close a memorable afternoon.

More live music at St Mary's is available soon.

On Saturday 13th April at 3pm Hannah Roper and Adrian Partington's programme includes" The Lark Ascending" and works by Holst and Coleridge-Taylor. On Saturday 11th May the exciting Meliora Collective visit Painswick for the first time. Their fascinating programme includes a wonderful Serenade by Brahms for 5 wind and 4 string instruments and Ligeti's setting of Old Hungarian Ballroom Dances which will have us all wanting to twirl!

Temporary closures on the A46

Where do I begin? I am lost for words, happily not a problem ever faced by Chris Evans from Dundry Nurseries, the speaker at Yew Trees WI February meeting.

Chris's story begins in 1947 when his grandfather started Dundry nurseries, Chris being the 3rd generation to run this traditional nursery and garden centre. Chris's passion for potatoes is well known to local gardeners as he offers 100 varieties of loose seed potatoes. He now has a new love: tomatoes and is a member of the International Tomato Growers Club where he recently encountered a navy blue tomato! Chris's inability to say 'no' is luckily so infectious that everyone he comes into contact with appears to

be similarly infected, enabling him to achieve the seemingly impossible! This goes someway to explain the success of The Butterfly Garden. It came into being in 2002 when six young autistic students visited the nursery, met Chris, and showed an interest in gardening. Thanks to Chris's deep belief that everyone should have the opportunity to live their life to the full and to integrate as much as possible with the real world, he suggested he might spare them a little time each week to help them pick up a few basic skills. From there the project unwittingly just grew and grew.

Today the Butterfly Garden is an educational recreational and therapeutic project for people dealing with issues they find disabling irrespective of their age or condition. It is visited by more than 150 students every week, and although initially the project was just about gardening, the activities have become very diverse and include woodwork, cookery, drama and dance. A recycling centre has been established and new opportunities are always welcomed. It is a profoundly moving story leaving Chris's audience with the highest admiration for his amazing achievements and of his zest for and love of life.

Gloucestershire Federation of WIs and although they scored well they were frustrated to just miss getting through to the next round. Spring is in the Air.

At last, there is some apricity in the weather. I learned this word recently and thought it rather interesting! Despite snowdrops having already flowered, I always think primroses and violets herald the start of spring. I love looking along the edges of scrub, we have cleared this winter, to find them flowering for the first time, having been released from dense shade. Similarly, cowslips. I spotted in flower in the last week of March

one in a sheltered sunny hollow, in flower, in the last week of March.

We have had another very wet, mild winter, continuing evidence of changing weather patterns. At this year's annual Large Blue meeting I saw data, collected over 13 years, showing the average ground temperature at one of the sites in Somerset had risen by nearly 2 degC. Evidence for climate change is plentiful and now much talked about, but meaningful action still seems in short supply. One of the consequences of so much rain is the continuing degradation of some of the paths on the Beacon. Increasing footfall causes more soil compaction, resulting in water running off rather than soaking in. This removes fine soil and deposits it as silt where the water gathers, creating gloopy mud no one wants to walk in. People then walk on the edges creating more compaction and run off, exacerbating the problem.

This year I will try to solve the problem in three or four of the worst areas by coordinating the main interested parties; PBCG, PGC, NE and the landowner. Everyone stands to benefit from resolving this problem.

The cows have now been moved to Cud Hill common for three or four weeks for which we receive a grazing payment from the Parish Council, very welcome funding for our group. After, the plan is to return them to the Beacon and graze them in smaller paddocks of specie poor grassland throughout the summer. If we can achieve this, it will be the first-time grazing has occurred all year round for probably a hundred years.

We have now finished our program of winter work parties, and I would like to publicly thank all who have turned out, often in awful weather, and worked so hard. The improvements would not be possible without them. Starting sessions on a Tuesday part way through the winter, means we have done nearly 1,200hrs work, a HUGE increase on last year.

Rising and Falling

At its March meeting, Painswick Local History Society heard from Chas Townley, who talked about 'The rise and fall of the Bisley Path'. This is an ancient route from Gloucester to Cirencester through Bisley, and also through Painswick. So 'rise and fall' is an accurate description of the route, coming up to Painswick Beacon,

down Gloucester Road, Bisley Street and Tibbiwell, up to Bulls Cross, down into the Slad valley, up again and so on all the way to Cirencester. It originally came into Cirencester through what is now Cirencester Park, recently and controversially subject to an entry charge for the first time in over 300 years of ownership by the Bathurst family. The exact route is unknown for some sections of the path, although in many places it is clear from the existence of hollow ways and in other sections from aerial photography. In the eighteenth century a small part of it was turnpiked.

But 'rise and fall' applies figuratively too, as the path gradually fell into disuse. The growth of Stroud and Cheltenham led to an increase in traffic on north / south routes along the valleys, rather than across them. In Painswick that led to New Street and the A46 replacing Gloucester Road and Bisley Street as the most important route through the village.

The next meeting of the Society will be on Tuesday 16th April when Kevin Ward, manager of the Stroud Museum in the Park will talk about the story of the Museum with a particular emphasis on some of its Painswick items and connections. 7.30pm at the Croft School.

Jottings

Across most of our five valleys we have steams running down to the Severn Estuary. Have you ever thought of what may be living under and around the stones as the water runs downhill to the bottom, getting deeper as it goes.

We have small fresh water shrimp living mostly on vegetable matter. They can be spotted wriggling about if you carefully lift up stones from the bottom of a stream. Caddisfly larvae make and shelter in tubes of sand on the stream bed. They develop into Caddisfly. Blackfly lay eggs on the stones where the larvae hatch and then crawl into the water and attach themselves to plants. They grow and pupate into Blackfly.

Riffle beetles live their entire lives crawling around underwater but cannot swim. Mosquito larvae hang under the water surface by their tails then develop into the pupae stage and into the mosquito we know.

The British Cray fish have mostly gone now but for a few colonies. They can grow to about four inches long, large enough to eat, though otters get there first.

There is a lot of wildlife in our streams and a lot more dependent on them for food, shelter and a place to breed. We also have some rare plants and mosses.

Property Report

The largest and perhaps the most impressive property coming to the market in early April is Greenhouse Court on Yokehouse Lane, a 5 bed country house with 5 bed cottage, coach house, stables, outbuildings, around 16 acres of land and views across to Painswick (Murrays, £3.75 million). Just a bit smaller though is Wragg Castle Farm on Wragg Castle Lane, a renovated and spacious 4 bed farmhouse with paddocks of 5.5 acres (Murrays, £2.25 million). Close to the centre of Painswick is Greenacres on Cheltenham Road, a substantial family home standing in a 1/3 acre plot (Hamptons, £1.45 million), already under offer, and in Pitchcombe, Old Weavers is another sizeable detached family house with a large garden (Murrays, £1.45 million). Over towards Sheepscombe at Painswick Court, the Granary is part of a cluster of barns converted to residential around 20 years ago (Hamptons, £1.25 million).
