Parish Council Meeting

The two Parish Councillor vacancies have been filled by co-opting Robin Roberts in Slad and Fiona Mackenzie-Jenkins in Painswick.

The Chairman,

Adrian Gyde, voiced his disappointment at several recent road closures, made worse by several days of inactivity. Sadly, we anticipate more resurfacing of Portway Hill in April, traffic delays as the 40 mph zones are introduced.

Fly Tipping

Prompted by a local increase in Fly Tipping we are all urged to keep a lookout for perpetrators and, without provocation, make sure incidents are reported to the Parish Council and/or Stroud District Council (SDC).

Parking

The meeting agreed to request SDC to organise more parking warden visits in order to discourage a recent rise in parking offences.

Village of the Year Competition

...is for Gloucestershire villages with fewer than 5,000 population. The last time Painswick won such a competition was 2009. The competition has complex application forms for four categories and a challenging closing date at the end of April.

Cash prizes totalling £15,000 will be awarded to the category winners and runners up (as well as a plaque and framed certificate).

District Council Report

Planning

The Council is contesting some of the claims of the Inspectors in respecting the Local Plan. (See your March 2025 Beacon.) For now the 2015 Local Plan is still in place and is used to determine planning applications.

Electric Vehicle Chargers

In Stamages Lane Cark Park, four 7kw chargers are in place. They occupy the space previously available for 7 or 8 cars in a frequently overfull car park.

New Council Plan 2025-2029

The plan was adopted on 13th February, with five priorities. Two new ones are: "Housing" and "Working for our communities". Confirmed budget includes £14 million to build 100 new Council homes, plus £5 million to purchase additional Council homes. Also replacement of over 200 litter bins.

Crowd Funding

All 17 projects from the first round of the new Stroud District crowd funding scheme, ("Stroud Funding") have reached this target! The second round of Stroud Funding is now open.

Nature Recovery

SDC has launched a "Nature Recovery Project" initially focussed on Council owned land. However you are welcome to contact the SDC team about other potential sites.

Resources for armed forces

SDC has resolved to provide "better resources" for local veterans and for members of the armed forces.





County Council Report

County Council election

Is on Thursday 1st May There are job opportunities to help at Polling Stations. Apply soon; the deadline to register to vote is 11th April.

Chief Executive

Jo Walker is to become the county's new Chief Executive from 19th May. She is currently Chief Executive of North Somerset Council. Jo began her career as a graduate trainee at GCC and rose to become Director of Highways, Transport and Waste; then Finance and Corporate Services.

Campaigning finally successful

After 20 years of campaigning, residents of Pitchcombe and their various County Councillors over that time are pleased that the areas along the A46 and B4073 (by the notorious "Pitchcombe fork") are finally to have the speed reduced from 50 to 40 mph. After 3 years of asking, the Disabled area near the Town Hall – much valued by the Friday Club and others – has finally been repainted.

Firefighters

GFRS (Gloucester Fire and Rescue Service) are keen to enrol new recruits as "On-call Fire Fighters". Recruits must be over 18 and live within 5 minutes of the on-call community fire station. Interested? Visit the GCC website for more.



Speed on A46 to be reduced. 40mph to be introducted.

The Parish councillors, residents of Pitchcombe and their County councillor, Sue Williams have received confirmation that the cameras and the 40MPH speed limit signage will be in place in April. This follows the lengthy traffic order application made in 2021 and the lengthy legal process culminating in the order being confirmed last year. The new restriction will be between Painswick and Stroud and the A4173 to Pitchcombe.

The community and councillors have campaigned for many years due to the number of accidents in the vicinity despite a major redesign of the junction some years ago. Evidence provided by the Parish confirmed the prevalence of incidents. The speed reduction was agreed last year but the Parish have been awaiting the installation of the speed



cameras and the additional signage .The Traffic Regulation Order aims to reduce the risk of accidents at the junction. The reduced traffic noise and CO2 emissions will improve the environment for those residing near the junction. Working in partnership with stakeholders and in collaboration with Gloucestershire County Council and the community has culminated in this positive outcome.

Juniper Hill Field Update

Another milestone was reached on Juniper Hill Field in late February, the recently acquired 20 acre field neighbouring Frith Wood and now part of an expanded Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust reserve. The field was the subject of a local campaign which argued that the previous owners, Woodland.co.uk, were failing to protect the skylark population and rare limestone grassland. On a wet and very chilly day, a dozen volunteers joined Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust staff to pull up around 120 fence posts which Woodlands.co.uk had installed to split the field to create small 'lifestyle plots' for sale. The posts were a threat to the skylark population, providing the perfect perching points for birds of prey and needed to be removed before the breeding season. The field has a vibrant population of skylarks, a bird which is on the red list as endangered, and signs will shortly be put in place to ask walkers to keep clear to avoid these ground nesting birds.



Earlier in February, Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust brought seventeen belted Galloway cattle in to graze the field, a crucial aspect of the effective management of grassland to ensure a rich diversity of flowers and insect life.

The Friends of Juniper Hill Field plans to continue and will work with GWT on plans for the future including surveying so we have a good baseline against which to measure improvements. Probus club Report



Mauro Cantoni, who is a Chartered Engineer and Chartered Project Professional, addressed the Club

on Thurs 6th March 2025 on the subject of the Nuclear Industry in UK. Employed by EDF (UK) for 15 years, Mauro is now Head of Central Projects & Programmes.

A capsulated uranium fuel pellet which fuels a nuclear reactor was passed around the audience. It was remarkably small, about the size of a Rowntrees wine gum, yet it could release as much energy as one ton of coal. Uranium is an abundant mineral and is full of energy.

The heart of a nuclear reactor is a tough forged steel vessel that houses fuel elements containing pure uranium fuel pellets. In a process called nuclear fission neutrons are fired at the uranium atoms, causing them to split and release more neutrons, releasing energy in the form of heat. The heat is removed from the reactor by a circulating fluid, typically water. This heat can then be used to generate steam, which drives turbines for electricity production.

Nuclear reactors are very reliable, capable of running for 24 hours a day for many months, if not years, without interruption, whatever the weather or season. Additionally, most nuclear reactors can operate for very long periods of time – over 60 years in many cases.

Radioactive waste is processed for ultimate storage below ground in vitrified (glass). The waste produced to meet the electricity needed by one person throughout their lifetime would fill one Coke can.

Nuclear fusion is the process that powers stars, like our Sun, where hundreds of millions of tonnes of hydrogen are fused into helium, generating immense amounts of heat and light. Research into nuclear fusion has continued since the 1940s. Just like nuclear fission, fusion is a low-carbon energy source, which emits no greenhouse gases or other pollutants.

Jottings.

Spring should be with us shortly, that's when plant life springs into life followed by flowering of plants everywhere. Why is there so much concern about pollination and pollinators? Pollination is when pollen from the stamen of a flower passes to the stigma of a flower of the same species. Some plants self pollinate, but most cross-pollinate, i.e. need pollen from other plants of the same species, for seed to be produced. If there is little pollination, we get poor crops yields.

The Honey Bee is the Queen of pollination followed by the Bumble bee, wasps, moths, butterflies and other insects. They are attracted to brightly coloured, often scented, flowers. Honey bees pollinate some 80% off flowering plants including 130 types of fruit and vegetables. Butterflies are generalist pollinators, so they don't have a specific relationship with one plant but bees tend to move between flowers of the same species. So they are important pollinators.

In America, now, farmers are having to buy hives of bees each year, to pollinate their crops. With large areas of one crop, a lot of pollinators, the bees, are needed for a short time and there is nothing else for them for the rest of the year, so they die. Climate change is making it difficult to time the flowering and availability of pollinators. Bee keepers in some countries follow the crop production, taking their hives to where needed. There are problems with pesticides such as neonicotinoids killing bees; and bees getting parasites like varroa.

Bees vibrate when they drink nectar from the flowers: This causes the pollen to be released from the anthers of the flowers. The bees move it around from flower to flower as they collect pollen in the "pollen baskets" on their hind legs. The pollen is stored in the hive or nesting holes for their young.

Some plants, like our cereal crops, are pollinated by the wind carrying the pollen from plant to plant. They are not colourful or scented. It was thought that wind pollination was inefficient with a lot of pollen being made and wasted, but current thinking is that it is a lot to do with the height of the crop. The newly bred, shorter stemmed wheat being grown here may not be as well pollinated.

A change of programme brought a celebration of the life of the late Lynn Steer. A proud son of Wales he had contributed much to Painswick and PMAG. Some of the most rousing tunes ever written paid tribute to his love of Rugby alongside favourite performers Bryn Terfel and Katherine Jenkins and a leading contemporary composer Carl Jenkins. Music that was both stirring and reflective.

Later in the month was Duncan Richardson's erudite study of Robert Schumann and Johannes Brahms, major composers of the romantic period, who spanned the 19th century and provided the bridge from Beethoven and Schubert to the impressionism and nationalism of the 20th century. There were well chosen

extracts of piano, chamber ensemble, song, choral and orchestra in illustration. Duncan had prepared an exemplary hand out of German lyrics with English translations. Clara Schumann was much in evidence, a composer and performer in her own right, she had provided encouragement and inspiration to her husband during his troubled short life and to the younger Brahms whose death was within a year of her own in 1896.

On 20th March PMAG welcomed back Dr David Lucas who took on the unenviable task of illustrating the life of Igor Stravinsky after his celebrated ballets Petrushka, Firebird and Rite of Spring. The centre piece of his talk was The Soldiers Tale first performed in 1918 in Lausanne and then shelved due to the Spanish flu and not performed in England until 1926 in Newcastle! A dark masterpiece of musical theatre about a soldier trading his soul and violin to the devil. This was tame after hearing some pieces of his later chamber music. Easier on the ear was an orchestrated suite of piano pieces written for his children to play and the later ballet Pulcinella based on music by the baroque Pergolesi. Commissioned by Diaghilev with sets by Picasso it was first performed in Paris in 1920. A major composer introducing the modern age perhaps necessitated PMAG's introduction to this difficult repertoire.

Constabulary. When I read what was on offer at Yew Trees WI February meeting I must admit to thinking "a worthy subject but I am sure there are more interesting ways to spend an evening"! How wrong I was! Rhiannon Parker proved to be a most entertaining speaker sprinkling her 'worthy' subject with a great deal of humour, making it both interesting and educational.

It is horrifying to learn that in 2023 6% of UK adults became victims of fraud. In fact the true figure is probably higher because many victims fail to report the crime as they wrongly blame themselves for it. Rhiannon stressed to her audience that they should not feel guilty; the criminals are so clever and professional. She gave some helpful advice on how to try and avoid being caught. This included the golden rule "Stop! Think!" Take at least 5 minutes to consider whether what you are being asked for, or offered, is true. Make sure you have strong passwords, never use the same password twice, update your devices and keep back-ups. She also left us with some very helpful printed information and made sure we know to whom to report any suspicious activity.

Obituary

Our recent meeting opened with the Group paying tribute to Anthony Fisher who sadly died in January. Anthony had served on the PPG since it started in 2013. He was also a leader in the use of technology to manage his diabetes and was featured on national radio encouraging others with this. We will miss him for his loyalty and pleasant company.

PPG Meeting

The main points from our recent meeting are:

Jenny Vallely, Practice Manager, reported on a very challenging last 18 months with fewer staff, ever increasing patient demand and extreme financial pressures. Only the willingness of the two remaining reception staff, Mandie and Alice, to work long extra hours carried them through. Three new members of staff have been recruited so improvements should be evident soon. (However, PPG members are concerned about the mental wellbeing of staff working in the Practice under extreme pressure.)

Dr Rhys Evans – the new GP contract

Dr Evans reported on what was known about changes planned for the GP 2025/26 annual contract. Immediately following the meeting he received the following cheering news: "The GP Council for England has now fully agreed changes to the 2025/26 contract [and has] the Government's commitment in writing 'to working with GPC England to secure a new substantive GP contract within this Parliament "

The new contract includes a maximum of 25 consultations per day for each GP becoming the new normal – twice that has been known at our Practice in the past (and still now) as GPs conscientiously try to keep up with demand but at a cost to themselves.

Our Practice is ahead of many in already offering what Wes Streeting has demanded:

- Appointment requests available online throughout the working day
- Ditto, medication queries and administrative requests
- Patients to be more able to ask to see their regular Doctor.

And we haven't suffered the much vaunted '8am scramble on the phone' for an appointment for some time thanks to eConsult.



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
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Plans to create the City of Painswick revealed

The age old debate as to whether we live in a town or a village could soon be a be a thing of the past, if plans now being drawn up for Painswick to be designated a city are given the go-ahead. The Beacon has seen a dossier, believed to have been drawn up in secret, that outlines the case for city status to be awarded and proposes a process to take the plan forward. It is understood that recent grants of city status to places such as St Asaph in Wales and Port Stanley in the Falkland Islands, each with a similar population to Painswick, have opened up the process to smaller communities. It is also pointed out in the dossier that the area of Painswick parish is considerably larger than that of the City of London.

The plans have not yet been considered by the Parish Council, or at least not in open session, but may be on the agenda soon. It is recognised that any formal application could take many months, if not years, to be realised, but there is believed to be an opportunity created by the coronation of King Charles in 2023. Grants of city status are traditionally associated with royal occasions and in view of the King's links with Gloucestershire, it is thought that he may be considering an award within the county. Painswick was famously visited by the King's late wife, Princess Diana, in 1985 and is also believed to have hosted the first King Charles in 1643.



If the City of Painswick were to be declared, it would mark a major change for the Parish Church, which could become the Cathedral Church of St Mary. Given the historical nature of the Church, its incomparable setting, and the fact that it has more bells than any other church in Gloucestershire, even including Gloucester Cathedral, this would be a well-deserved honour.



An anniversary to be celebrated

A truly significant anniversary is almost upon us, and one which is worth not only acknowledging but also definitely celebrating. Eighty years ago, 1945, after six long years, World War II was thankfully coming to an end and on 8th May, Victory in Europe Day, Germany surrendered unconditionally to the Allies. Communities everywhere celebrated VE Day. And so it was in Painswick.

Everyone, regardless of age, was affected by the war and VE Day was therefore of real importance. To mark this notable anniversary, probably the last one involving those who were actually in the front line, there will be a display in St Marys Church highlighting Painswick's experience of VE Day and the war.

This is a notable anniversary and one which we should all acknowledge as of real importance. VE Day will be celebrated nationally this year on 5th May. Do go into the church and see how Painswick was involved. The display will be there for a few days from the beginning of May. *Carol Maxwell*

New Insights on St Mary's Painswick Local

At the March meeting of the Local History Society our members were treated to a fabulous presentation



on the history of St Mary's Church. Andrew Leach had preferred to talk in St Mary's itself rather than at our usual venue of The Croft School – as he said "why have pictures on a screen when you can see the real thing?"

Though some of us may have thought we knew quite a bit about its history Andrew left us all walking away with many new insights. Did you know that the pillars of the south aisle were once classical fluted columns; that there was no tracery in the north aisle windows; that the south aisle windows have been changed from rounded openings to their current gothic style? All of this was the work of our Victorian forbears who thought it better to have a consistent style throughout rather than the mix that had formed over the previous centuries.

Other interesting points were that the Church in pre-Reformation times was painted a bright red throughout; that the 'subdued' baroque reredos built by the Bryans in the south aisle, moved from the chancel in the Victorian restorations, and sadly hidden from general view by the current position of the organ is perhaps unique in that it is built of stone unlike general baroque pieces which are made from wood.

In addition to the fabric of the building itself Andrew also put out on display some interesting vestments and chalices that are held and still used to this day. An outstanding presentation enjoyed by all.

Our next meeting is back in The Croft School on April 18th when we will have a talk on Tudor medicine by Kirsty Bingham.



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Finally, Some Decent Weather.

What a winter we have just had, so much rain and so little sun. As I write this the air is still cool, but the sun is shining and there is warmth in it. Spring has arrived.

The relentless rain has had a negative effect on many parts of the site with surface water forming silty puddles. Our new slitter was used on the golf fairways and many paths at the end of January and the golf club has available funds to hire a tractor and driver again to redo these areas soon.

Some sections of track have been resurfaced. The section by the 2nd green and the drainage borehole behind the 5th green have been paid for by the golf club's Conservation Enhancement Scheme and the section leading towards the trig point was paid for by PBCG. The total cost was just over £11,000. There is more to do, but raising money is hard. An application to Natural England's capital project fund may secure more to fund the section of the Cotswold Way by the Quarry Road this summer.

News from this year's Large Blue meeting has not been the best. National numbers are down about 50%. Excess water damages the ants' nests, destroying the butterfly larvae simultaneously. Unfortunately, the Butterfly Conservation annual report mirrors this trend, showing heavily reduced numbers of most species last year. This is due to the mild, wet winter and spring of 23/24. Half of British butterflies are now on the endangered list.

The extreme weather events we are experiencing are putting enormous stress on the natural world, making anything we can do to help even more important.

We are now scaling back work parties to prevent damage to emerging plants and reptiles and to prevent disturbance to nesting birds. However, the vegetation survey has started, and we need volunteers to help. Please contact me if interested.


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Property Report

As one outstanding country house, Greenhouse Court, goes under offer, two more are being offered for sale. Washwell House on Cheltenham Road, a 7 bedroom house with 1 bed annexe, swimming pool and 4 acres of land, was once the home of the Wemyss sisters, commemorated by the Memorial Garden birdbath. It is offered by Murrays at $\pounds 2.35$ million. Hamptons meanwhile have Holcombe Barn, a detached barn conversion with heated outdoor pool and views over rolling pastures, at $\pounds 1.95$ million. Almost in the centre of the village, Acacia House by Goddards Garage is a Victorian detached house with 5 beds, good-sized garden and parking (Murrays, $\pounds 895,000$). Almost directly behind it, Appleways on Gloucester Street is a 3 bed link-detached bungalow hidden away from view (Hamptons, $\pounds 750,000$ – already under offer). 
