This September, Painswick Rococo Garden is open Wednesday to Sunday, 10am–5pm. It's a wonderful time to visit – the Exedra Garden is alive with African marigolds, *Mirabilis jalapa*, and *Salvia horminum* 'Oxford Blue', while trees begin to glow with autumn reds and golds. In the

kitchen garden, heritage apples and pears are ripening; some head to the café, while the surplus is pressed into juice for the shop.

We're delighted to introduce Amy Taylor as the new Director of Painswick Rococo Garden – though she's no stranger to this magical place. Originally from New York, Amy first visited the Garden in 2008. That summer, she chose Rococo Garden as the setting for an early date with a fellow bellringer.

It turned out to be a day to remember – the beginning of a relationship that would eventually lead to marriage! A my reflects, "Everything in my life changed around that time, and I knew I wanted to live in England permanently."

While studying in Bath, Amy was taught by Cathryn Spence, the author of Thomas Robins: Artist and Observer of the Eighteenth-Century Garden, which explores the work of the artist behind the famous 1748 painting that inspired the restoration of the Garden. Cathryn's fascination with Painswick Rococo



Garden, left a lasting impression on Amy. Amy's ties to the Garden don't end there. She previously worked at National Trust's Snowshill Manor, where she met Dominic Hamilton, Rococo Garden's former Director. Over the years, the Garden remained a quiet constant in her life – a peaceful retreat to unwind, reconnect with nature and spend time with her husband Phil.

"I've seen how the Garden has evolved over the last few years" she says. "Not just in the planting and restoration, but in the way it's come alive – with families, with events, with new energy and creativity."

Looking ahead, Amy is keen to build on this momentum. She's excited to lead the dedicated team, work closely with trustees and continue improving the Garden's visitor facilities – all the while honouring its unique character, history, and spirit.

#### Wonderful Rent a Grannies!

The first 1000 days of a child's life are a time of tremendous potential and enormous vulnerability. How fortunate therefore that in Leicester in 1973, Margaret Harrison recognised the need to support young mothers and founded Home-Start. This much needed charity now boasts 180 local independent Home-Starts in the UK and can be found in 22 other countries across



the world. Members of Yew Trees WI were delighted to welcome Heather Cunild, the Chair of the Stroud and Gloucester Home-Start to their July meeting, to learn about the wonderful work they do supporting over 600 families in our area every year.

In addition to the paid co-ordinators who assess a family's needs and measure outcomes, the majority of the groundwork is done by a band of trained volunteers who can best be described as "rent a granny"! They are totally non-judgemental and once a week go into a home and help the mother with whatever she most needs. It can be anything from hanging up the washing, looking after a disabled child while the mother spends time with other able-bodied children or perhaps helping with twins. Many young mothers are lacking in self-esteem, and the volunteer may well take a bag of toys along and teach the new mother how to play with her child or may accompany her out to the shops or for a walk. Homes where there is active domestic abuse, aggressive dogs or drug addiction are the only ones excluded from this wonderful, supportive service. In addition, there are antenatal and postnatal groups as well as a perinatal mental health peer support programme; and fathers are not left out! A recent addition is "Dads Matter" a project enabling fathers to have the best possible relationship with their children. A truly remarkable charity.

At our next meeting on Tuesday 23rd September Paul Murphy will talk on The von Trapp Family. This is the story of four extraordinary women - and a couple of men as well! The Sound of Music was a wonderful film, but the real story is surprisingly different to the one portrayed in the movie. So, ladies, why not come along and learn about it at 7.30 pm in The Church Rooms? A warm welcome awaits you.

history and that of its surrounding area reflect this. The Local History Society endeavours to explore as much of this history as possible both in written form (the Chronicles) and in its programme of unmissable presentations given by knowledgeable local speakers.

The forthcoming programme has been designed to cover a wide range of topics with broad appeal and the new season of talks takes off in September when Ray Wilson, an excellent speaker, will give a presentation on the industrial heritage of the Cotswolds with which of course Painswick was heavily involved. The 2025-26 programme thereafter spans a good range of intriguing topics covering a broad set of interests – secret Stroud, lordship in the landscape, pilgrims and pilgrimage, Cranham potteries, Milo of Gloucester (friend of Pain), highlights from the Stroud Museum, and more, plus the outing in May.


## Directory 2026 - it's your call

## **Charles Wilfred Orr**Composer of song settings to Housman's poems

Charles Wilfred Orr, usually known to musicians as C.W. Orr (but to his friends as Willie), was one of England's finest song composers, known particularly for his settings of poems from 'A Shropshire Lad' by A.E. Housman. He lived in Painswick for over 40 years, although for much of that period his musical output was relatively limited.

He was born in Cheltenham in 1893, for a time attending Cheltenham College, although he suffered from ill health as a child. He enlisted in the Coldstream Guards in 1915, but was invalided out little more than a year later, and from then on concentrated on music. He had introduced himself to Delius, whom he much admired, in 1915 and the older man became a mentor to him, carrying on a long correspondence. An even greater influence

though was the poet A.E. Housman. Orr's song cycle 'Seven songs from A Shropshire Lad' was composed between 1927 and 1931 and is possibly still his best known work.

He came back repeatedly to Housman's work and set 24 of his poems to music.

He developed tuberculosis in 1923, taking a long time to recover and had continuing health problems, which resulted in him being advised to leave London. He came to Painswick, with his wife Helen in 1934, buying Church House in St Mary's Street, right on the edge of the churchyard. They renamed it 'Clevelands', although it is now Church House again. He became a familiar figure in the village, walking regularly on the Beacon, playing billiards at the Institute and taking part in many local activities. He was one the founders of the Painswick Music Society, which recently celebrated its 75th anniversary.

He continued to compose throughout the 1930s and in 1940 a further 'Three songs from A Shropshire Lad' were published. He wrote six more songs in the 1950s, the last in 1957 with then nothing more

in the remaining 19 years of his life. In later years he was troubled by deafness,

which distorted musical sounds, particularly higher pitched ones, and became rather disillusioned by what he felt was the lack of recognition of his earlier work.

Despite his own relative disappointment, he is now recognised as one of the leading English song composers of the 20th century, and is certainly well remembered in Painswick, where Church House displays Painswick's only official blue plaque. There is also a high relief portrait of him in the Town Hall, created by the sculptor Anthea Dutot.

## Local Jazz Trio to play at Stroud Brewery Friday 12th September, 7.30 - 11pm

The Utrillo Jazz Trio was formed in 2018 by Painswick resident and pianist Francis Sanville and has built up its reputation with performances including a packed-out Christmas Eve gig in the Tap Room at Stroud Brewery. They'll be back there on Friday 12th

September to perform two sets in the Upper Room inspired by Jazz greats such as George Shearing, Bill Evans, Dave Brubeck and Chick Corea elegant melodies, lush harmonies, and irresistible rhythms that will have both jazz aficionados and first-time listeners hooked.

As well as Francis, the trio consists of Peter Martin on double bass and Richie Ashton-Phillips on drums. They aim to make jazz inclusive and accessible for all, developing original arrangements of well-known classic tunes, combining the blues, swing, and 20th-century classical harmony. You can expect to hear melodies and tunes you know - and some you don't. And the ones you know, you'll hear in ways you might not quite expect. But above all, it should be an evening of wonderful, beautiful music.



### **Jottings**

I was watching blackbirds on our lawn and noticing one moving and tilting its head. They have excellent hearing and can hear the worms moving below the surface, find them and dig them up. The birds also have very good eyesight so it is best that worms do not stick or move on the surface. Blackbirds can also eat small slugs by dragging them along grass to rub off the slime. Thrushes and robins look for the worm heads as well, but robins also dig small holes in the lawn to see if there are any worms. Seagulls and some other birds tap their feet on the ground to mimic rain falling. Worms come to the surface when there is rain.

When we are out ploughing in the fields, turning over the soil, we bring up plenty of worms, attracting lots of birds. When the Gloucester tip was open you would get hundreds of gulls coming inland to feed, diving for food, but this has mainly disappeared since the tip was closed.

Treated sewage sludge (called biosolids) can be used as fertilizer on farms in this country, but is quite highly regulated. It provides good nutrients and organic matter so there is not much need for chemical fertilizers. Before a farmer uses it you need to take a soil sample to see what nutrients there are present, so that there is a balance of different ones. Sewage must not be spread near water sources and you must inject it into the soil so you do not get any run off. This method also reduces odour. Washouts from vegetable packing and washing down big dairy bottling plants can also provide nutrients to the soil.

### **Restarting work parties**

The approaching end of the summer holidays turns my thoughts to starting work parties again. We plan to have one every week, every other Saturday and every other Wednesday. We are always looking to recruit new members, so why not make this the year when you come and help? The Beacon is such an important site for wildlife, but it is under huge pressure from increasing visitors' numbers. Even if you are unable to manage the hard physical work, there are other tasks that may be more suitable. We need help with cattle checking, vegetation surveying, documenting, fund raising, litter picking and path repairs. No experience is necessary, but an abundance of enthusiasm helps!

If you are interested, please join us at our annual meeting in the Town Hall on Thursday, 11th, at 19:30. This is a perfect opportunity to enroll, learn about our activities over the last year, and hear a brilliant talk on trees by John Parker from the Gloucestershire Association of Arborists.

In the coming season we will revisit many of the areas we worked in three or four years ago. The main objective will be to recut and treat any excessive bramble growth and remove about 50% of the scrub regrowth. In other sections, larger trees will be felled to allow space for the grassland to expand into. Many of these trees will be diseased ash which, if they are by paths, need to come down to ensure public safety.

We have funds which are ring-fenced for path repairs and some aggregate supplied by the Parish Council, so initially we intend to repair the section of the Cotswold Way leading from the Quarry Road towards The Royal William. Drainage channels will also be cut in to prevent surface water flooding down towards the road. The slitter, purchased last year, will be put to good use again on fairways and paths to help aerate the soil and improve drainage.

Finally, the vegetation survey has detected record numbers of Autumn Lady's Tresses, a rare orchid normally found on coastal areas. In one location, approximately 60 x 80m, we counted nearly four hundred.

Volunteers needed

In my time with PBCG I've only ever seen two! They are only 50 – 75mm tall and need a short sward height. Surprisingly, given the drought conditions, they were extremely



healthy. Little is known about the pollination, but the seeds are like dust and require penetration from specific fungi mycelium for germination. The plant then parasitizes the fungi for about seven years before it flowers. More amazing ecology on our doorstep.

# Summary of a year at The Croft

At the end of another very busy year packed with many different activities, events and visits, I would like to share with you some of the achievements and successes we have had at The Croft.



We continue to see positive impacts on outcomes across the school as a result of our ongoing development of teaching. We have once again had excellent external data results in summer 2025 where, in the majority of areas, our children scored significantly above national scores.

Children from every year group have participated in a variety of sporting events and tournaments. Some of the highlights have been: winning the boys small schools football cup and the summer athletics competition. Several pupils were placed in the top 10 in cross-country and subsequently represented the county in national events. We have had players from Gloucester Rugby Club, Forest Green Rovers, Hartpury Rugby and an expert dance teacher in school to lead sessions with the children, as well as a multitude of sporting after school clubs. Thirty children from years 4, 5 and 6 joined thousands of others from across the country at the Young Voices concert in Birmingham, whilst our choir was involved in the Christmas carol service organised by the Rococo Garden. In April, a group of 35 children and staff went to the Bristol Hippodrome to watch 'Chitty Chitty Bang Bang' which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

I would like to extend my thanks to all our parents and carers for their support this year which has ranged from attending events, transporting children to and from events, ensuring homework was done, uniform worn correctly and children being on time for school. We all really appreciate your on-going support.

I have been playing pickleball for three years. This year I had the amazing opportunity to play


